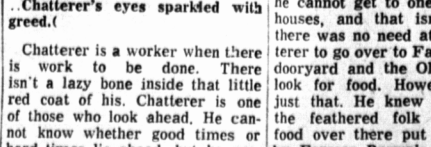
All Settled Amicably Is Chou's View

LONDON (CP) — Premier Chou En-lai returned to Moscow Thursday after visits to restive Poland and shattered Hungary and declared, "all has been settled amicably." In a speech Chou blamed the Hungarian revolt on "western imperialists." Moscow Radio reported his remarks. He made no reference to his discussions in Warsaw. There have been indications Chou did not reach complete unanimity of views with Polish leaders. In Budapest, Chou and Premier Janos Kadar signed a joint declaration that had China fully agreeing with the action of the Soviet Union in using its armed might to crush the Hungarian revolt. Chou promised the leaders of the Kremlin that Red China will "exert all its efforts to strengthen the eternal and indissoluble ties between us." The main task now was to "unite in every way the socialist camp." BULGARIAN AGREES Soviet Premier Bulganin expressed appreciation of the stand taken by Chou. Both Chou and Bulganin assailed President Eisenhower's new Middle East policy, with Bulganin describing it as "colonialism in a new form." Chou said the Eisenhower doctrine is an attempt to impose "U.S. economic and political rule" on the Middle East. Chou heaped praise on the Soviet Union for its aid to the Chinese Communist revolution. "All our successes have been made possible only with the support of the Soviet Union. No force in the world can make China turn from its chosen path."

Ten Years Have Done Wonders For Army's Fort Churchill

FORTH CHURCHILL, Man. — Early northern explorers, who die like flies of bitter cold and relentless scurvy here more than two centuries ago, would find many changes today. The weather is just as bleak and relentless as ever. But modern technology and improved facilities have made all the difference to every-day life. Where the ancient travellers subsisted on mouldering salt pork and pemican, modern residents eat as well as people in any Canadian city. And where the old Indian traders faced long weeks of inactivity, today's Churchillians have almost all the amenities of the modern age. The Canadian Army, which took over the northern base from the Department of Transport October 1, 1946, has seen to it that the British built a fort here to trade with the Indians; a railway reached here in 1929, and the United States built an airfield and camp here during the Second World War. Now, Canadian, British and US troops all use the camp, although at the present time British and US soldiers are mainly concerned with tasks connected with the International Geophysical Year. Some, however, including the Canadian armed forces, are here solely to test men, clothing and equipment under conditions of extreme cold. The cold overrules every other thought at this time of year, and troops undergoing field tests are in no uncertain terms before they leave their quarters. That Churchill rates as the third-cold centre in the world. The others are Snag in the Yukon, and Thule, Greenland. Tough as they are, 45 men of the 2nd Battalion, The Royal 22e Regiment, recently recorded 14 cases of frostbite in a single day and out on the tundra, and British US servicemen have suffered too. Temperatures during the past two weeks have been cruel - but no more cruel that they normally are here. They have fallen as low as 36 degrees below zero, and blowing snow, swirling in the teeth of bitter winds, frequently cuts visibility in the open to only a few yards. But few people bother about the temperature. It is the wind-chill factor they are mainly interested in, and it can be deadly. Troops dress, eat and act accordingly. Since the Canadian Army took over Fort Churchill as a permanent joint experimental and training centre, it has changed to such an extent that the handful of
