WEDDING GUESTS POISONED.—According to a Chicago despatch nearly a hundred guests, who assembled to witness the marriage of Morris Pollack and Annie Schwan, were poisoned at the wedding dinner. In less than half an hour nearly everyone in the house was in a helpless condition. The general belief is that chicken prepared in a copper kettle contained the poison.

A HIGH TARIFF According to the Cleveland Leader the Hon. Oliver Root, of Newport, was made defendant in a singular suit filed lately by Miss Ida Mae Randall, formerly a domestic in his household. The plaintiff alleges that on December 29th last, the defendant, O. W. Root, did in Campbellton County, Ky., at his residence, where plaintiff was employed, unlawfully kiss plaintiff three times, which was against plaintiff's will and to her damage in the sum of \$5,000.

PLEA FOR PEACE—A circular appealing for peace and pleading for the Boers, signed by four hundred clergymen of all denomination in the Netherlands, has just been delivered to the ministers of all Christian churches in Great Britain, says a London cable. It closes, "We beseech you brethren, to use your influence that all such in England that on Christian principles disapprove of this war may try whatever lawfully may be done for its speedy cessation."

NEVER AGAIN.—The Mail and Empire puts it this way: If Britain has made a mistake in her treatment of the Boers it has been a mistake on the side of leniency. She permitted them to tax her people and spend their money in munitions of war which could only be used against her. After they had created a great military power she held back her troops because she did not want to irritate them. Not until they declared war did she enter into serious preparations for a fight. She is paying for her leniency. But of course it cannot occur again.

FRUIT GROWERS' MEETING.—The public meeting and entertainment in Kindergarten Hall, on the evening of the 24th instant, will merit a large patronage. It will be under the patronage of His Honor the Lieutenant Governor and Mrs. McIntyre, His Lordship the Bishop of Charlottetown and His Worship the Mayor and Mrs. Warburton. A short programme will be given, consisting of recitations, music and songs by Charlottetown favorites, interspersed with one or two short speeches. Admission 10 cents for all parts of the Hall.

THE CHARLOTTETOWN HOSPITAL.—The report of the Charlottetown Hospital for 1899 shows that 185 patients were admitted during the year, 100 paying and 85 not paying. Four deaths occurred. Sixty surgical operations were performed. Medicine was dispensed gratis to 46 outsiders. The contributions to the annual collection was \$462.17. The Hospital has all modern improvements and has attached a staff of skilled physicians and nurses. The institution is evidently doing an excellent work in the community and is deserving of every assistance.

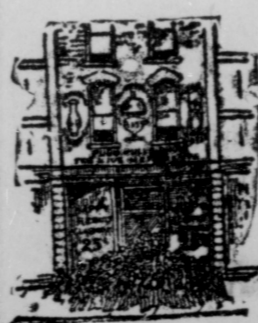
