into the steel wool and take a firm grip.

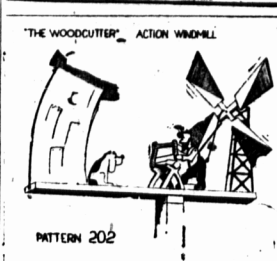

About the only other reason for making this chic sale wind-mill is that it swivels on top of a post to indicate the direction of the wind. Cream 1/2 cup butter; add 1 cup white sugar; 2 eggs yolks; 1/2 cup flour; 1 cup chopped dates; 1 cup chopped walnuts; 1 teaspoon baking powder. Spread in pan. Cover with meringue of one cup brown sugar and 2 egg whites and use as topping. Bake all in oven at 350 degrees for half an hour.
