Montreal Alouettes Edge Ottawa Roughriders 22-20

Montreal Alouettes squeaked a 22-20 victory over the resurgent Ottawa Rough Riders Monday in a thriller before 23,014 Labor Day fans, the 1955 Big Four champions grabbing their third victory of the new football season against no defeats.

Coming back to their home field after defeating the Riders 42-10 Friday night in Ottawa, Alouettes had to come from behind to catch up in the first quarter, and in the final saw an eight-point lead almost wiped out by the rampaging Riders.

At Hamilton, the Tiger-Cats turned a fumble and three intercepted passes into four touchdowns to defeat the hapless Toronto Argonauts 31-21 before a record crowd of 20,725.

It was a sweep for Ticats in their traditional home-and-home series against Argos and the victors, second in the starts, kept them just two points behind the Als. Ottawa has won one, the

opener against Hamilton, and Toronto remains winless.

The debut at Hamilton was a sad one for Arnie Galiffa, former all-American chopped by British Columbia Lions and rushed into the breach when Argonauts lost their first and second string signal-callers—Tom Dubinski and Gerry Doucette—through injuries. He tossed 49 passes but the interceptions and a fumble by Bucky Curtis killed off Argonaut chances.

CONNECTS FOR THREE
At that, Galiffa threw three touchdown passes. His first went to Menan Schriever in the second quarter and the others to Earl Blair in the final quarter when the powerful Ticats were ahead 30-7. He had just about a 50-per cent pass completion percentage, making good on 25 throws. Mike Falls converted all Toronto touchdowns to complete the scoring.

Tex Robinson paced Ticat scorers with two touchdowns. Hal Waggoner and Howard Schnellenberger got the others. Steve Onechuk kicked two singles, a field goal and a single and Cam Fraser added a single in the third quarter. Nobby Wirkowski, who played most of the game at quarter for Ticats, tossed a touchdown pass to Schnellenberger.

Ronnie Knox, the UCLA glamor boy, played on defence the first 15 minutes, and showed only briefly at quarter in the second, third and final periods. They attempted 28 passes and completed 21 for 182 yards.

Argonauts moved the yardsticks 28 times against 22 for Hamilton the ground against Ticats' 160. Galiffa gained 326 yards passing.

RELIEVES PRESSURE
A pass interception and a 51-yard run-back by Hal Patterson in the fourth quarter took the pressure off the Als and Tex Coulter booted a single just before the final gun.

Earlier in the quarter, Hal Ledyard's long pass to Joe Burton for

a touchdown had left the Riders with only a one-point deficit, but the Alouettes defence then tightened and Patterson's sensational interception of a pass intended for Burton deep in Montreal territory put an end to Ottawa's hopes.

A touchdown by Tom Lewis early in the opening quarter put the Riders in front, but the Als got even on a long touchdown pass by Sam Etcheverry to Patterson.

The Als surrendered the lead again in the second quarter on Karl Harding's touchdown pass. The convert was missed by Don St. John and eight minutes later the Als went in front to stay, Bud Korchak converting after Pat Abbruzzi had cracked over.

The Als took a 21-13 lead in the third quarter on Bob Pascal's interception of a pass and his gallop from near midfield for a converted touchdown.

The Riders showed more power along the line than they did Friday and Etcheverry frequently was hurried in his passes, completing 17 of 31 attempts.

Tom Lewis and St. John were the most consistent ground gainers for the Riders, who picked up 240 yards on the ground to Montreal's 154.

Needles Is Retired For The Season

ALTNAT CITY, N.J. (AP)—Kentucky Derby winner Needles was retired for the season Monday and will be pointed for the \$100,000-added Widener Handicap at Hialeah Park in Florida next winter.

Trainer Hugh Fountaine said the Florida-bred colt "needs a rest from his busy campaign," but that there is nothing wrong with the three-year-old star.

Needles is the leading candidate for three-year-old championship honors, having won four races of \$100,000-added value, the Florida Derby at Hialeah, the Florida Derby at Gulfstream Park, the Belmont at Churchill Downs and the Belmont Stakes in New York.

Owned by the D. and H. Stable of Jack Dudley and Bonnie Heale, the son of Ponder-Noodle Soup has earned \$440,850 this year. He is the leading money-winner thoroughbred to date in 1956. Rex Ellsworth's Swaps is next with \$323,650 and Nashua third with \$291,550.

In his last start, the \$100,000-added American Derby Aug. 18 at Washington Park in Chicago Needles finished fifth.

Dodgers Sign Ralph Branca

BROOKLYN (AP) — Brooklyn Dodgers, suffering from an acute pitching shortage in the late stages of the National League pennant race, Monday signed one of their former mound stars, Ralph Branca, as a free agent.

Branca, who was the Dodgers from 1944 to 1953, has been out of organized baseball since last season, when he had a 3-3 record with Minneapolis in the American Association.
