

Pharaohs' Dream In Strontium-90

ASWAN (AP)—Four thousand years ago, a pharaoh named Amenhotep III dreamed of harnessing the mighty Nile River to bring prosperity to the peasants of Egypt.

Today, 7,500 Egyptians and 370 Russian technicians are blasting and digging their way through a forbidding desert of granite to realize that ancient dream.

This is the Aswan high dam, project auspicious of President Nasser's socialist revolution, which celebrates its 10th anniversary Monday.

Nasser set off the first dynamite blast 450 miles south of Cairo, 2½ years ago.

In the evening on the east bank when the heat drops from its daytime temperature of 120 degrees, lights flare across the desert and a growing Soviet power shovels clear 1,000 tons of rock from the granite cliffs.

The digging is for a mile-long bypass canal, which will divert the Nile's waters through a series of 12 giant electric turbines, two coffee dams on the main dam begun. Target date for finishing this high, rising 340 feet from the sandy riverbed, is 1968.

Cost of the project is \$1,182,000,000. The Egyptians are putting up \$234,000,000.

OTTAWA (CP)—Average levels of all radioactive fallout declined slightly in Canada in the first three months of 1962, but levels of dangerous strontium-90 showed a gradual increase, the health department said recently.

The decrease in overall fallout and the increase in strontium-90 both followed the Russian series of nuclear tests last fall in the Soviet Arctic.

The total amount of fallout declined due to decay of highly radioactive products which made up the bulk of the fallout activity reaching the earth immediately after a nuclear explosion.

A health department report on fallout measurements in the January-March period shows a decrease in overall radioactivity in air samples and in rainfall and a slight decline in amounts of strontium-90 detected in milk powder samples.

However, the report shows a steady increase in levels of strontium-90 found in rainfall since last October. These are well below maximum international safe levels and less than those detected following Russian tests in 1953. Officials say they represent only a fraction of the total natural radiation.

Aswan itself, a dusty town, changes are already apparent in the amount of rain. Strontium-90 levels are about 100,000 to 1,000,000 times that of natural background.
