LETTERS TO THE EDITOR.

\$360,000 Left in the People's Pocket.

SIR,—In your issue of the 15th April last appears an article showing a comparison of the receipts and expenditures between the two political parties of the Province for the past fourteen years, and in that comparison you proved most conclusively that by the strictest economy the Liberal Conservative Government had saved to this Province in the reduction of yearly expenditure, and the refunds and grants which they obtained from the Dominion Government in twelve years, the enormous sum of over \$1,600,000. The figures were plainly and intelligently put, and could not be disproved by the opposition. But it seems to me that you overlooked a most important item in your calculation, which should have been added to the above amount, viz: the \$360,000 per year known as the "Davies tax course," which would have amounted in—say the last ten years, to \$3,600,000. Now, no one disputes that if the Grits had been in power to this time, that that tax would ever have been taken off the shoulders of the people, so that the real saving to the Province would amount to over \$1,950,000 for the past 12 years. Now then, if we are told that \$200,000 was drawn from capital in that time, we can deduct it and still leave the sum of about \$1,750,000 as saved to the people in twelve years by the indefatigable exertions and rigid economy of the Liberal-Conservative Government.

By the way, does it not come with a very bad grace from the late opposition to talk so loud about drawing from capital when their own Grit Legislative Council actually passed that bill? It could not have been done if they had said no. However, drawing from capital and issuing debentures amount to one and the same thing, and that is their present policy. They want the treasury benches—they will not be particular where the money comes from—as long as it comes. Still we are told that the late government has a debt on hand of from fifty to a hundred thousand dollars. Why, when the Davies government went out of power in the spring of '79, they were in debt, I think, some \$70,000, and yet twelve years have elapsed since, and absolutely no taxes imposed for at least nine years of that time, and yet we have only about the same old debt that they left there. Let the people remember, however, that in the meantime some \$360,000 have been left in their pockets, which would have been taken out by taxes had the late opposition remained in power.

Supreme Court.

On Tuesday the examination of Benj. Rogers and Stanley W. Brown, two of the parties summoned as agents in the suits against S. H. Brown and Alex. Brown, absconding debtors, was concluded, and they were on motion of Mr. F. L. Hazard discharged, with costs to be paid by plaintiffs in each suit.

Susannah Coffin, appellant, vs. Thos. D. Coffin, respondent. Mr. Morson read notice of abandonment of appeal, and moved that judgment of the court below be confirmed with costs, and the judgment be had according to the conviction. Court, be it so.

Peter Patterson and another vs. Henry T. LePage.—Argument on return of rule for a new trial. This case stands over until Michaelmas Term.

The court appointed James Gorman, of Campbellton, Lot 4, and Michael McCormack, of Souris, to be Commissioners for taking affidavits in the Supreme Court.

Commission under the great seal of Prince Edward Island appointing Hon. Frederick Peters Attorney and Advocate for the Province of P. E. Island was read.

Benjamin Rogers vs. Peter Gallant (Charles.) Mr. Morson for defendant, argued in support of demurrer. The Attorney-General showed cause against demurrer and Mr. Morson replied. Court dismissed demurrer with costs.

John Healy vs. Wm. Heard and another.—On motion of Mr. Mellish, the court ordered the argument in the return of rule nisi for new trial to stand over until next term.

Boute vs. Maxfield.—The court ordered this case to stand over till next term.

Application of Arthur S. Johnson for certiorari to remove conviction under the C. T. A.—By consent this case stands over till next term.

On motion of Malcolm McLeod, Q. C., Wm. L. Strickland is to be article to J. E. Wyatt for the remainder of his term as student at law.

Court adjourned sine die.

A cure of consumption by the Koch process is reported from the Montefiore Home at New York. The patient received his first inoculation in December, and is now discharged as cured. This would be great news for consumptives but for the explanation of the physician in charge, which runs in this strain: "Of course, as in any chronic disease, the cure is relative. He may suffer a relapse within a year or two, brought about by poor food, by living in contracted and poorly ventilated rooms or by exposure. Such a relapse, however, would not alter the opinion of a physician that the man is cured at the present time." In other words, cure of consumption by Koch lymph has "a string to it." It is a cure that is not a cure.

British genius and statesmanship is working wonders with the finances of Egypt. The revenue last year of the once bankrupt country was 10 1/2 million sterling, the largest ever collected. And this does not mean increased burdens on the fallahen; the postal and other public service rates have been reduced and £250,000 has been taken off the corvée tax. It is good to be under British rule.

HOW TO DESTROY THE INTELLECTUAL AND MORAL FACULTIES.—1. If a boy does his work thoroughly and well, give him harder work. If he does not do this thoroughly, tell him that it is his own fault and that he is growing both stupid and idle.

2. Impress upon him daily that the object of school work is to do better than some other boy or to appear to do so.

3. Do not allow the use of cribs, but ignore their use.

4. When a boy can do his mathematical work better than other boys of his age, tell him that he should also be able to do his classical work better (his mathematical faculty will enable him to see the force of this reasoning.)

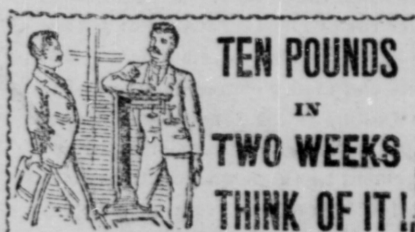
5. Tell every boy that he ought to spend three hours on his evening lessons, but tell his father that they should take one and a half hours.

6. If a boy sends in better work than you expect from him, tell him that he ought to have sent in better work before.

7. Always tell every boy in the class that he ought to be higher up than he is.

These rules, if fully and carefully carried out, will turn bright boys into dull ones in a short time, and successfully confuse their ideas of right and wrong.

ANOTHER SKY SCRAPER.—New York is famed for its big newspaper buildings, but one which the proprietors of the New York Sun are about to erect appears likely to eclipse other efforts in that direction. The area of the present Sun building is fifty feet on Park Row and fifty feet on Frankfort street. The architect proposes to erect a thirty-story building, 450 feet in altitude on the site. It will have two arches at the main entrance on Park Row, on top of which will be granite and marble, and above this will rise a straw-colored structure of steel, which is as simple in design as the Washington monument. This will rise for twenty stories, and then there will be a gallery in the style of the Italian Renaissance, with columns and pilasters. A structure reaching to a point will surmount the building, instead of a dome or tower.
