SUMMARY OF PROCEEDINGS.

MARCH 27.

At the forenoon session a message was read from His Honor the Administrator, enclosing the estimates for the year, and a resolution moving that the House go into committee of supply to-morrow passed.

Table of estimates: Justice \$14,587, Board of Health 250, Executive Council 200, Education 114,469, Provincial Exhibition 4,050, Asylum 16,660, Interest 7,250, Inspectors of Licenses 1,000, Legislative Council 1,000, House of Assembly 12,500, Sessional Laws, Books for Library, Lieut-Governor's office, Fire Dept, Ch'town, Blind Asylum, Halifax, Mrs Mary Whelan, Telephone Co subsidy, Queen Square Gardens, Poor House and paupers, Postage, Prov Secy and Public Lands, Prov Auditor, etc, Public Works office, Public Buildings, Ferris, Queen's Co, SS Kluh, etc, Rocky Point and SS Southport, Ferris, Prince Co, De King's Co, Roads and bridges, Road machines, Registrar, Provincial Building, Stenographer and typewriter, Bonus to Dairy Association, New steamer for Southport Ferry, Paris green for distribution, Subsidy for steamer to run between Souris, Georgetown, Montague, Gardigan, Grand River, Wood Islands, Pinette, Charlottetown and Pictou.

Mr. Clow submitted a bill incorporating the Murray Harbor South Hall Company, which was read a third time.

[The following speech made by Mr. Shaw on the resolution providing for the introduction of a bill disfranchising Dominion officials was unavoidably crowded out of yesterday's issue.]

Mr. Shaw followed. [He thought all would agree that the case was becoming desperate when the Government were resorting to such iniquitous measures as the gerrymander and the disfranchisement.]

We are told that the Government is not afraid to discuss this matter in the face of the public. Last year the Government discussed these measures with closed doors—with the press and the public excluded. But notwithstanding all their secrecy, when they passed the bill the Lieutenant-Governor refused to assent to it and the people were thus saved.

This year it looks as if the Government were getting even on the Lieutenant-Governor for his action: there is not one single dollar in the estimates for Government disbursements. When a great change in the constitution such as is now proposed, is being made, he thought the people should be heard on the matter—that the iniquitous gerrymander and disfranchising measures should not be rushed through now on the eve of an election. Nothing was heard about them at the last election. It is our duty, as the representatives of the people, to lay this matter before them and have their opinion at the polls. This is the just and proper course. To pass such a measure on the eve of an election is an outrage. In order to perpetrate their power the Government have recourse to the most tyrannical measures. It is quite true that our respective parliaments have different duties to fulfil. But so far as interfering with voters by the Dominion Government goes, no person on the other side of the House could point out any instance where this was done. He denied the statement that a section-man in his district had been dismissed from his position because he had not voted for him. The man was discharged for neglecting his work and allowing an accident to occur on the track two years after the election. The Leader of the Government has told you the railway men vote Conservative. This is quite natural. From 1878 to the present time, the Liberal-Conservatives have been in power, and as a result any vacancies that have occurred on the railway were filled by the appointing of Conservatives; and it is reasonable to suppose that these offices will continue to be filled by Conservatives. This is probably the only reason there is for the disfranchising of the railway men. The Leader of the Government blames the railway men for his defeat, and the hon. member for Belfast says they are driven to the poll-like sheep to the slaughter. But the young men on the railway always vote as they think proper. The spirit of revenge, therefore, prompts this action of the Government in disfranchising these men. He held that it was wrong in the spirit of Toryism that has been pursued ever since the present Administration came

into power. We are told that the measure has been adopted in Ontario and Nova Scotia where it works well. But if an injustice has been perpetrated on the people of these Provinces there is no reason why it should be perpetrated here; and the move was certainly a most unrighteous and unjust one. The Government say, however, that they are doing the officials a good turn by disfranchising them—that they have asked for this disfranchisement. He did not believe there was a man in the country, Dominion official or otherwise, who had ever expressed a desire to be disfranchised. They say these officials are not allowed to vote as they please; that they will relieve them of the power to vote. This looks a good deal like rubbing the salt instead of putting on a plaster. Why didn't they disfranchise the Local Government officials? This would not suit the Government. Is there a man in the Registry Office who would dare to vote against the Local Government? The same applies to the officials in the Land Office and other branches of the service. Would one of the Supervisors in the country dare vote against the Local Government? It is clear to be seen that when they disfranchise the Dominion officials they do so in their own selfish interests. They tell us we pressed our claims on the Dominion Government in a milk-and-water way, when we well remember that telling us in the House and elsewhere that we had no claims. We all know how successful the late Government were in pressing our claims, and we know equally well that since they have not moved a hand or foot in this matter. He felt sure that when the day of reckoning arrived—when they came before the people to answer for their high crimes and misdemeanors—that they would be sent back to their respective homes for their infamous conduct.

The resolution passed, and a bill in accordance therewith was submitted and read a first time. Several questions asked by members of the Opposition some days ago were repeated, and the information desired was again promised as soon as possible. House adjourned.

MARCH 28.

This forenoon the House met at 11 45, and went into committee on the bill incorporating the Murray Harbor South Hall Company, with Mr. A. McLeod in the chair. The bill was reported agreed to without amendment, and ordered to be read a third time to-morrow.

On motion of Mr. Warburton, the act incorporating the Stanley Bridge Dairying Company was read a second time, with Mr. H. C. Macdonald in the chair, and reported agreed to without amendment.

On motion of Dr. Jenkins, debate on the bill respecting the dispensing and sale of opium and other drugs was resumed. Mr. Underbury in the chair. He moved that a clause be inserted in the bill, providing that the formulas of all medicines put up outside the Province be registered with the Provincial Secretary, and that the person or persons peddling said medicines outside the country shall pay a license fee of \$—.

The bill was discussed by Mr. Speaker, Mr. McKay, Mr. Arsenault, Mr. Rogers, Mr. Farquharson, Mr. Bell and others. Progress was reported and the House took recess.

Indignation Meeting at Tracadie.

The largest meeting ever held at Tracadie Cross was convened last evening to consider the situation of public affairs at the present time. Michael Ready, Esq., was in the chair, and Mr. Bernard McCabe, secretary. The meeting was addressed at length by D. Ferguson and P. Keoughan, Esq., who ably exposed the dangerous character of the Peters Legislation. They gave the Government no credit for abandoning the mortgage this year, nor for any other deviations which they might make in the circumstances of the Reserves Bill. Had not Governor Carvell intervened an election would ere now have been held, in which Mr. Peters would have wielded to the utmost, the tyrannical powers he had assumed in the bill. With districts gerrymandered, electors disfranchised, mortgages voting in all the districts of the Island and rabid partisans acting as returning officers, an appeal to the people would be a mere farce. The speakers charged the Leader of the Government with using the power which he took to himself in the Land Office corruptly, making reductions sometimes reaching 70 per cent. for political purposes. The extraordinary bungling of the finances of the Province were fully dealt with, and it was clearly shown that Peters and Cumiskey had violated their solemn promises to the people regarding making revenues and expenditure meet, as well as in other respects.

Mr. Joseph Doyle, of Point D-Roche, spoke briefly in defence of the Government. His plea was really that the Government should not be so severely censured on account of their weakness. Having only a majority of one, they were forced by one of their members into doing what was not right. He did not name the "wicked member," but it was thought that the reference was to Mr. Bell.

He was effectively replied to by Mr. Francis Hughes, of Black River, who plainly expressed the views of the farmers of the meeting. He ridiculed Messrs. Peters and Cumiskey's plea for not attending the meeting on account of the urgency of their Legislative work. Peters and Cumiskey must think the people very silly when they advise them to hold meetings after proration. It would be locking the stable after the horses were stolen.

The following resolution was moved by Mr. James P. Dougan and seconded by Mr. Francis Hughes: Resolved, That this meeting strongly condemns the arbitrary and corrupt measures of the present Government, and declares its want of confidence in the present members for the Districts, Messrs. Peters and Cumiskey, who have by their actions violated their solemn pre-election promises.

On this resolution being put to the meeting there were only two "noes." Hearty cheers were then given for the Districts, Messrs. Peters and Cumiskey, who were three rousing ones for Lieut-Governor Carvell.
