Unemployment Claims Are Said Nearing Peak

Seasonal unemployment has been rising rapidly during the month of January, and the Charlottetown National Employment Office reports that it will soon be at its peak. More than 4,000 people which includes a large number of fishermen, are now registered at the Charlottetown office as being unemployed. The figures are slightly higher than they were at the same time last year. Officials of the Charlottetown office believe that this is traceable to two causes. The first of these is the fact that more people were engaged in the fishing industry last summer than for some years, and more people qualified for unemployment insurance benefits. To qualify for these benefits, the first step is to register as being unemployed, and most of the fishermen acquired sufficient contributions (stamps) to qualify for benefits. The second reason given by local officials, is attributed to the large number of people who were employed last year in the Charlottetown office area, and who accordingly qualified for unemployment insurance benefits this winter.

It is believed that despite last year's unfavorable conditions in other parts of Canada, that more people were employed in King's and Queen's Counties than ever before. King's and Queen's Counties are administered by the Charlottetown office, and all records in connection with benefits are maintained at the local office. The proof that more people were employed last year than ever before is seen in the very large number of people who worked long enough to qualify for unemployment insurance benefits. More people are drawn into the unemployment net, and many of these were seasonally employed in building, road, or wharf construction. Last year the peak of seasonal unemployment was reached in mid-February. This year because of the early on-set of winter conditions, it may reach its highest point somewhat earlier. At any rate, it is assured already that more people will draw unemployment insurance benefits than ever before in the history of the office. FOLLOWS PATTERN Every year since the office was opened, there has been an increase in the number of people who have qualified for benefits. In this respect, 1959 follows the pattern of other years. Singularly enough the local office officials point out, that not for many years have so many construction jobs been underway in the winter months, but severe weather, particularly frost has kept down the working force, on many of these jobs. However, if the weather should moderate, a considerable number of tradesmen and labourers may return to work long before the end of winter. The jobs campaign which is being carried out by the local office, has been quite successful. As a measure of its success, the office points to the decision of the Maritime Electric Company, to commence a new construction job almost immediately. It can also be said that the firm of P. T. Holman, will continue the building of a super market throughout the winter. The new Royal Bank building is another instance of a big institution carrying out its plans despite weather conditions. Still other projects which are going ahead are the nurses home at the Charlottetown Hospital, and a new wing of the Prince Edward Island Hospital. The provincial government is pushing ahead with an addition to the Vocational School. CITIZENS RESPOND Charlottetown employed officials point out that before the "do it now" campaign was started five or six years ago, no effort would have been made to carry out projects of this type in the winter months. In addition to the above work, a number of private citizens, in response to a canvass carried out by telephone, by the women's organizations of Charlottetown, have filed a number of orders for men at the employment office. It is too early yet to assess fully the number of people who are being put to work through the efforts of the women's organizations.

Theft Hearing Opens In City Police Court

The case of a Charlottetown man charged with break, entry and theft was adjourned until Tuesday when the accused appeared for preliminary hearing in Charlottetown police court Friday morning. A second city man charged with the same offense was also remanded until Tuesday. The charge arose as a result of a break and theft at the New Way Furniture Company Limited, Jan. 15th. Four witnesses were heard by Magistrate K.M. Martin at Friday's sitting. Store manager Clarence T. Vallis, identified two radios which had been stolen as property of the firm. He said they retailed at \$59.95, and also stated another radio valued at \$29.95 had been stolen. William Leslie Alexander, identified the radios and said he had put them in the window shortly before the day they were stolen. He said they were in the window when he left the shop and the store was locked that evening.
