EARL SPENCER, Lord Lieut. of Ireland, performed the ceremony of unveiling the Queen's portrait, at Belfast, on the 18th inst. On reaching the Town Hall, the Lord Lieutenant was greeted with mingled cheers and groans. In his speech, Earl Spencer referred to the troubles of Ireland and dwelt upon the prospects of the country. He congratulated the citizens of Belfast upon their peaceful character and adherence to law and order.

APPLICATION has been made to the Customs department for the admission of an article called "tea-dust." A specimen having been submitted for analysis and found to consist mainly of sand and other ingredients, apparently sweepings, and some particles of tea, the inland revenue department declared it deleterious to health and its admission into Canada will be refused.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

The Egyptian Question.

LONDON, June 19. In the House of Commons, to-day, the Marquis of Hartington, Secretary of State for War, said that the Government believed that the British and Egyptian forces now in Egypt are sufficient to defend Upper Egypt. The French Ambassador at Constantinople has informed the Grand Vizier that Turkish intervention in Egypt and the Sudan is excluded under the terms of agreement between England and France.

A Fatal Accident.

OTTAWA, June 19. An accident occurred last night on the Canada Pacific Railway, near Papineauville, by which one man lost his life, had both his legs broken, and seven were injured. An empty lumber train collided with a gravel train. The accident was caused by neglect on the part of the Conductor of the gravel train.

Business Notes.

MONTREAL, June 19. Samuel Carsley, dry goods merchant, of this city, and Carsley & Co., wholesale dry goods merchants, have each entered actions for damages against the Bradstreet Mercantile Agency. An informal meeting of the creditors of S. H. May & Co., wholesale oil, paint and varnish merchants, was held to-day. Their liabilities are \$72,000.

The Dynamiters.

BELFAST, June 19. At the banquet given in honor of Earl Spencer last night, referring to the dynamiters he said, some statesmen might fall as others had fallen, by the hands of an assassin, but where one fell another would be ready to take his place, showing that the English nation was not to be frightened.

A Desperate Shooting Affray.

WINNIPEG, June 19. A despatch from Fort McLeod, Northwest Territory, says a dispute arose between a crowd of Indian and a cowboy there. The latter shot the Indian, who, in the throes of death, raised himself and shot his slayer with a revolver. Before dying the cowboy put five more shots into the Indian's body.

Widespread Fear of Dynamiters.

LONDON, June 19. For the first time in many years the gates of the Palace Yard are locked at night, after the sitting of Parliament. This is only a new evidence of the widespread fear of further dynamite outrages.

Another Fatal Railway Accident.

ATCHISON, Kan., June 19. By a collision on the Burlington and Missouri Railway, yesterday, about thirty persons were injured, several fatally.

Progress of the Franchise Bill.

LONDON, June 19. In the House of Commons to-night, the Franchise Bill passed the committee stage.

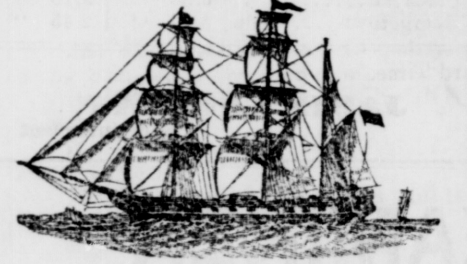
