Quite a sensation was created at Bear River Station, on Thursday. Late at night, a man entered the residence of a poor widow at that place and attempted to commit an indecent assault on her person. Her cries attracted the attention of a number of her neighbors and they hastened to her assistance. They, however, arrived too late to arrest the miscreant, who made his escape in the darkness. On returning home, the party who came to the rescue met a live bear, who had been attacking sheep in the vicinity. Not wishing to attack him bear-handed, the party repaired to a barn for pitchforks, hoes, axes, etc., but on the return bruin had also escaped. A lively search is kept up by the people of Bear River Station for bruin who attacked the sheep, and the miscreant who attacked the lone widow.

The village of St. Henri, a short distance from Montreal, was the scene of a sad shooting accident. It appears that a young man named Lewis Lavalee, who had spent many years in the Western States, returned recently to get married. He was to have been married on the 8th, and was exhibiting to his sister some bridal presents to be given to his bride, when he picked up his revolver and said it had been his constant companion in the West. He directed his sister to pull the trigger and insisted that she should do so. She obeyed, and to her dismay it exploded. Seeing her brother fall, she ran up through the house almost a raving maniac. Medical attendance was had at once, when it was found that the bullet had entered the right groin, had gone through the lower part of the stomach and was lodged in the left hip, from which place it was afterwards taken. Lavalee was very low at last accounts and cannot survive.

**TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.**

**Governor of Behera Executed.**

**Ulemas Discontented.**

**New Cable to Alexandria.**

ALEXANDRIA, August 12. Arabi has given orders for the execution of the Governor of Behera. The Governor was executed.

The Turkish Consul at Bombay has received a deputation of Ulemas, who demanded a full explanation of the traitorous connection of Turkish troops with British soldiers in Egypt.

A new cable has been laid to the port of Alexandria, and the line is fully completed and in working order.

**SCARCITY OF WATER.**

PARIS, Aug. 11. The official census of France, just published, gives the population of the country at thirty-seven and a half millions.

**An Irish Agitator Arrested!**

**RAILWAY FUSION.**

MONTREAL, Aug. 11. News has been received here of the consummation of the fusion of the Grand Trunk and the Great Western Companies of Canada. At the meeting the amalgamation was confirmed by a show of hands, but a poll was demanded. The result of the poll decided the amalgamation, and to-day the Grand Trunk owns over 3,330 miles of railway.

**GENERAL CABLE NEWS.**

CONSTANTINOPLE, Aug. 10.

The Conference will take no cognizance of the Anglo-Turkish military convention. It is understood that Lord Dufferin does not insist that England shall have supreme command of troops in Egypt.

SUDA BAY, Aug. 10.

A Turkish transport with artillery arrived to-day.

ALEXANDRIA, Aug. 10.

The Khedive's agent at Constantinople has announced the departure of Dervish Pasha on board the Ottoman yacht *Iszeden*, with a small force of troops.

It is reported that the enemy will evacuate the works opposite Ramleh positions, and that consequently there will be no attack for the present.

Two of Arabi Pasha's spies have been captured.

The troops will henceforth be supplied with water from condensers.

Arabi Pasha has mounted eleven additional guns in his first line of intrenchments.

PENZAANCE, Aug. 10.

The steamer *Mosel* was in the same position as last reported. She is firm and steady. Divers reported her bottom from stem to foremast smashed; other parts of the vessel are uninjured. The water from forward has flowed aft and is now over the main deck to the mainmast at low water.

LONDON, Aug. 10.

The Standard's St. Petersburg correspondent says that the Emperor and Empress and other members of the Imperial family, accompanied by the Queen of the Hellenes, arrived on Sunday at Krasiwoles. On Monday they visited the military camp in carriages, and inspected the troops. The camp was gaily decorated, and massed bands, comprising 800 musicians, played the National Anthem. The force taking part in the manoeuvres numbered 45,000.

TUCSON, Aug. 10.

A special despatch from Guayamas, Sonora, says that on Wednesday of last week the Apaches raided and killed all the inhabitants of Sancho Cariso, Sahuaripa district, Sonora, Mexico—women and children included—and burnt the houses. On Saturday morning they murdered a vagrante near Pelomos. On Monday they ambushed a scouting party of rancheros, consisting of fourteen men, two of which only escaped, eleven being left on the field, while one of them, who was shot through the legs, was dragged a short distance into the bush. The day mail rider was shot while crossing Riochico.
