### Changes In Passenger Fares Are Announced

MONTREAL, Que., April 4 — J. A. Brass, chairman of the Canadian Passenger Association, announced today that pursuant to an order of the Board of Transport Commissioners for Canada passenger fares in the Maritime Provinces and in the Province of Quebec east of Levis and Charny, for distances up to 200 miles, were adjusted on April 1 and that this revision brings about minor increases and decreases in these passenger fares.

the same date passenger fares on all rail lines east of Montreal, for distances over 200 miles were placed on standard rate per mile basis of four cents first class and three and one half cents coach class. This change establishes such fares on the same level as that prevailing generally throughout Canada.

### Repeats Demand For Probe Of Charities

TORONTO, April 4 — (CP) — E. B. Jolliffe, Opposition leader in the Ontario Legislature, has repeated his demand for a royal commission to investigate the operation of charities in the Province.

The C. C. F. leader, speaking during debate on a government bill to permit investigation of the accounts of incorporated charitable organizations, said some charity campaigns were undertaken "by men whose principal qualifications were that they were promoters of mining stocks."

The bill was approved in principle. It provides for a court hearing on the complaint of any individual, after which the judge can order an investigation of accounts of the charity by Ontario's public trustee.

Mr. Jolliffe announced earlier today that once the bill is passed he will ask for an investigation of the operations of the United Emergency Fund for Britain. He told the House last week that his investigations showed the fund had sent only \$380 worth of food parcels to Britain from total collections of \$593,000 and said the rest had been spent in promotion, advertising and other expenses.

The bill might provide a measure of protection and might be a deterrent, he told the Legislature, but further inquiry by a royal commission was needed to provide a satisfactory answer to the complex problem.

### Sport Echoes From Prince County

The title above tells you what our job is in the realm of sports, but, believe us, there are no sport echoes originating in Prince County at the present time. This week Prince Edward Island has only one sport centre and that is the Charlottetown Forum. Never before, perhaps, has a single sport gripped the Island population as has this final series for the Maritime major hockey championship between Sydney Millionaires and Charlottetown Islanders. The Charlottetown Forum is the hub and there are a lot of bumpy spokes leading to it, but that isn't keeping the easterners or westerners from converging on the capital for this momentous trial of hockey skill and strength.

So far (after the third game has been played) the battle looks to us like a horse race between two champions of the turf. "Millionaires" is a fast, steady-gaited animal who can be relied upon not to break under any circumstances. "Islander" has a shade more speed when at his best but is liable to break and lose the race any second. You've got to classify him as a "long shot" because of this.

In other words, when the Islanders pour it on, they push the money men right back on their heels. But the fact that they are playing for two championships at the same time cramps their style a bit. With Vitale anxious to retain his heavyweight boxing championship won in the "Big Four", with some of the other boys on the team hankering to be classed as "logical contenders" or "outstanding boxers" the game of hockey sometimes gets pushed into the discards. You just can't shine at both sports at one and the same time. Where would Ezzard Charles be if while in the ring he tried to play a little hockey on the side? We think that if you really want to hurt a hockey player the best thing to do is to give him a good fast puck in the net. There, after all, is his tender spot, the place where it hurts most.

A puck in the net reminds us that a Sydney sports writer and a Halifax sports writer have both, apparently decided that the disputed shot at Gordon in the third period of the second game in Sydney was actually a goal. We'll bet a pound of butter we were handier that net than either one of them. We were, in fact, almost right behind the net. The shot was very fast and we couldn't state positively whether the puck never left the ice as the Sydney scribe so positively states or not, but we caught a glimpse of it striking the left goal post and bouncing out and, a thing we couldn't explain the wafer seemed to travel towards the post from the opposite direction from which the puck was fired. This didn't seem logical but after reading that Gordon had said he got a piece of the puck with his hand and then it hit the post, we realize that what we saw ties in with Gordon's statement. The goal judge and both referees failed to see the puck enter the net. The net was specially constructed so that pucks entering do not rebound. Yet a sports writer sitting on the sidelines half way up the ice blandly states that "the play stood out like a reporter's shiny pants in the Easter parade." If the goal was so clear cut, why wasn't it disputed then and there instead of playing two or three minutes of hockey before beginning the investigation? We'll tell you why. A group of rabid fans behind the net kept shouting it was a goal until they caught the ear of "Red" MacRae and then the argument started. Why have goal judges at all? Why not let those eagle-eyed reporters tell us what they have seen with their radar-equipped peepers when a close one comes up?
