He said in the Commons that this may result from Mr. Fleming's intention to raise wool cloth tariffs, if he can "worm out of our trade agreements," to restore the British preferential tariff margin following increases in the duty on British wool cloth announced in the budget speech. These prospective future tariff increases, said Mr. Pickersgill, Liberal MP for Bonavista - Twillingate, Nfld., and former immigration minister, could cost Newfoundland fishermen their Italian market. Italy had lately begun to sell more wool to Canada. "If we are going to kick the Italians in the teeth as the government has announced it is going to kick the British in the teeth," it would jeopardize the market for all east-coast fish.

Blames Tito For Death Of Imre Nagy. NIAGARA FALLS, Ont. (CP)—Constantin Fotich, a former Yugoslav ambassador in Washington, Sunday blamed Marshal Tito of Yugoslavia for the execution of former Hungarian premier Imre Nagy. Mr. Fotich, a prominent Serbian-in-exile, told a rally of some 4,000 former Chetniks (former Yugoslav guerrillas) from Canada and the United States: "When Tito released Nagy from his embassy in Budapest to the Hungarian Kadar regime he knew he was in fact throwing him to the bloodthirsty wolves of the Kremlin." The crowd cheered when Mr. Fotich challenged Marshal Tito to bring the Nagy issue before the United Nations and demand a full investigation into the circumstances of his death.

WANT THEIR MEN BACK ALGIERS (AP)—A hundred veiled Moslem women marched on police headquarters here Tuesday and demanded the release of husbands, brothers and sons held prisoners by French authorities in concentration camps for many months.
