

Ponder Effect Of Mental Outlook As Disease Cause

MONTREAL (CP) — Psychologists at the Allan Memorial Institute here have found that repeated statements, made by a man himself or listening to others, can not only change his behavior but modify his muscle tone.

The possibility is thus raised of altering the function of a man's glands or internal organs by the same means.

The experimental procedure was described Tuesday by Dr. D. Ewen Cameron in a report on progress in research in the department of psychiatry at McGill University. Invited to the meeting at the institute were representatives of federal, provincial and municipal governments, city organizations and industries and members of foundations.

Dr. Cameron, head of the de-

partment, said that as a result of the experiments the question arises how far it would be possible by psychic driving to shift the functioning of some of the endocrine glands or some of the internal organs.

MAY CAUSE DISEASE

The procedure "may open the way to understanding how thinking about and worrying about and constantly being aware of particular area of the body may actually cause the latter development of disease."

Other items of research reported to the meeting included the use of high frequency currents to improve the memory span of older persons and development of a method, through drugs and brain-wave readings, for measuring emotional states in somewhat

the same way a thermometer indicates the temperatures of a person.

Use of repeated statements, called "psychic driving," is based on precise reproduction by tape recorder. It not only gives the words of what is said but a true reproduction of tones, faintest pauses, almost imperceptible hesitations and changes in emphasis

Celebrates Golden Jubilee As A Jesuit

HALIFAX, N.S. — Rev. Donald Francis McDonald, S.J., celebrated his Golden Jubilee as a member of the Society of Jesus on October 28, with a Solemn High Mass in the Canadian Martyrs Church and a parish reception at Saint Mary's University in the afternoon.

Father McDonald was born in Saint Andrews, Prince Edward Island, in 1881, and was educated at Saint Dunstons University and where he was an active member of the football team. He entered the Society of Jesus in 1906 in Montreal, and from then until his ordination, studied at Sault-au-Roulet, Poughkeepsie, N. Y., and Immaculate Conception in Montreal. Also, during this time, he spent three years teaching at Loyola College in Montreal.

Father McDonald was ordained in 1920 and after two more years spent teaching at Loyola College, he did a year of ascetical theology in Belgium.

In 1923, Father McDonald was sent to Shanghai, where he worked among the English speaking people in a parish cared for by a group of Jesuits from Paris. He remained in Shanghai until 1939, and on his return to Canada, spent a year preaching retreats and missions at the Jesuit Seminary in Toronto. For three years following that, he was Rector of Regopolis College in Kingston. It was at this time that the Sisters of Saint Martha from Prince Edward Island began their mission in Kingston. In 1944, Father McDonald went back to parish work, being made pastor of Saint Andrews Church in Port Arthur. Then, after three years spent as minister of Saint Paul's College in Winnipeg and curate at Saint Ignace Church in Winnipeg, Father McDonald came to Halifax, where he has been assistant priest at Canadian Martyrs Parish since 1954.

Father McDonald celebrated Solemn High Mass in Canadian Martyrs Church, which is also the Chapel of Saint Mary's University, on his jubilee day. He was assisted by Rev. James Murphy, S.J., an deacon, and Rev. Jacques Monet, S.J., as subdeacon.

In the afternoon, a parish reunion was held at the University in Father McDonald's honor. Am-

ong the guests at the reunion was Father McDonald's brother, Dr. Gus McDonald of Prince Edward Island. Presentations by the Catholic Womens League, the Children of Mary, the Holy Name Society and the John Berchman Society of the parish.

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Campney Says Estimated Cost Of Mid-Canada Radar Line Up

QUEBEC (CP) — Defence Minister Campney said Monday the radar warning line has risen by estimated cost of the Mid-Canada \$30,000,000 to an estimated \$200,000,000.

He also told the annual meeting here of the Air Industries and Transport Association of Canada that more than 320 Canadian-built F-86 Sabre jet fighters have been shipped to six countries.

Mr. Campney said it was estimated three years ago that the cost of the Mid-Canada line, being built roughly along Canada's 55th parallel, would be \$170,000,000.

"It now seems probable that with rising costs and some problems which were not foreseen at that time, the final outlay will be of the order of \$200,000,000," he said. "The task has indeed been a tremendous one." Canada is paying for the Mid-Canada line, 800 PLANE'S TRANSFERRED.

The minister said 34 Sabre jets have been sold to South Africa, six to Colombia and 24 to Israel.

More than 200 planes had been transferred to Greece and Turkey under the NATO mutual aid program and the government recently agreed to the transfer of 75 to West Germany.

Mr. Campney said construction of the Mid-Canada line probably is the most important single event which has taken place in recent years in Canadian aviation.

Mr. Campney said Canada is co-operating fully with the United States in the construction of the DEW (Distant Early Warning) radar line in the Canadian Arctic.

"I know of no instance in this whole project where the slightest difficulty has arisen or the slightest attempt has been made by our southern neighbors to impair our sovereignty in the north or to assert any claims incompatible with our national pride as Canadians," he said. "Our sovereignty is fully maintained."

The statements were included in the text of a speech issued to the press before delivery.

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
