

**RESTORE SERVICE**  
 OTTAWA (CP)—The federal government has given formal approval for British Overseas Airways Corporation to re-establish its air service linking Montreal and the West Indies. The Air Transport Board, in a decision dated Aug. 25, approved an application by the airline to resume its service to Bermuda, Barbados, Nassau, Jamaica, Trinidad and Antigua. The previous licence was suspended May 28, 1964.

### Islam Said Returning To Tunisia

TUNIS (AP)—The spell of Islam is returning to Tunisia as the country seeks closer ties with the Arab world.

President Habib Bourguiba has called for more accent on religion in public and private life. He has promised more money for the priests of Islam and called for prayers at public meetings.

The move followed the closing of 102 of 109 Roman Catholic churches. Catholicism flourished during French rule. The disbanding of the European community—from 300,000 to independence to some 40,000 now—was given as the reason for curtailing the Roman Catholic churches.

Bourguiba's call for more place for Islam in the life of the Tunisians came in a recent speech in the port city of Mahdia. Previously the president favored strict separation of religion and state.

Party and youth organizations have been asked to stress religion, and authorities generally have been told to pay more attention to the propagation of faith.

QUEEN, CHEVRIER TO DINE  
 LONDON (CP)—Queen Elizabeth has accepted an invitation to dine with Canadian High Commissioner Lionel Chevrier (Oct. 2) before she flies to Canada Oct. 5, the high commissioner's office announced Thursday. Accompanied by Prince Philip, the Queen will be entertained by the high commissioner and Mme. Chevrier, the first time the Queen has visited the Canadian residence here since her last trip to Canada in 1959.

Eli's greedy and immoral sons are slain when the Philistines begin their war on Israel and capture the Ark of the Covenant.—1 Samuel 4.

The Ark brings misfortune to the Philistines, destroying their gods, smiting them with tumors. They return to Israel with rich gifts.—1 Samuel 5, 6, 7.

Samuel assembles a repentant Israel at Mizpah. The Philistines attack and are defeated with God's help.—1 Samuel 6, 7.

## God Prepares A Leader

 The book of Judges ends in an era of violence, anarchy and confusion. Israel was surrounded by enemies who, from time

to time, made life miserable for them, enslaving many. Religious life was at a low ebb; the nation was in danger of permanent subjugation and losing its identity as God's chosen people. Only through a great leader could faithfulness to God be restored, enemies subdued and the whole moral life of the people raised up. The man who was to be lifted up in this capacity was Samuel, the last of the Judges.

The story opens with the account of the somewhat miraculous conception of Samuel by Hannah. During an annual sacrifice at the Temple, this unhappy woman, one of two wives of Elkanah, cries to the Lord because she has barren. If the Lord will give her a son, she promises to dedicate him to the Lord.

Hannah leaves Samuel in the temple of Shiloh and the old priest brings him up in the service of the Lord. Historians present us with an appealing picture of Samuel doing every possible thing to keep God's house in order and beauty, serving the Lord according to his age and capabilities. Each year when Hannah came to the temple to make sacrifice, she brought her son with her, and she would kiss him as he grew to be a man.

Eli had two grown sons who, because they were descended from Aaron, were his successors to the priesthood. Through their greed and immoral conduct, they brought shame and disgrace to the religious practices of Israel.

on the Israelites. Eli's sons are slain the day the Philistines capture the Ark of the Covenant. Hearing of the public disaster, Eli falls dead and Samuel succeeds him as judge of Israel.

Samuel's life thus far, God has been obeyed and Samuel's conscience is void of offense to God and man. With the roots of his life firmly established, one can expect a mature life, strength, character, wisdom in hours of crisis, and power in delivering the Word of God. All these traits marked the subsequent years of Samuel.

In order that Israel might learn a lesson before being brought into a new era of blessing, and that the Philistines might learn the lesson that no religious work was done when the national life of Israel was at a low ebb.

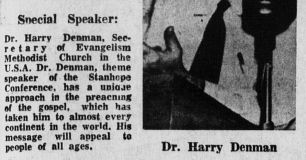
First, the statue of their god Dagon is broken mysteriously and then broken. Then the tyrant, hearing of the public disaster, falls dead and Samuel succeeds him as judge of Israel.

When the Philistines fall upon the assembly, the Israelites, with God's help, subdue them. Thereafter, Samuel judges Israel—apparently in peace and prosperity—for many years.

## Colporteurs Serve Remote Rural Areas

Mr. Herbert Kessler, newly appointed Bible Society secretary for Northern Rhodesia and Nyasaland, reports that 22 colporteurs serve rural areas not likely to be reached by the usual channels of distribution. In these areas it has been estimated that more than 400,000 families live off the soil. One-tenth of these earn a reasonable income from their crops. Another one-tenth are getting a little more than they need to stay alive. The vast remainder are considered to be living at subsistence level or on the bread-line.

Mr. Kessler continues, "It is under such conditions that the rural colporteurs work, going out by bicycle with a metal case of Scriptures; sometimes traveling up to 50 miles to sell only a few Bibles. In many areas there are no complete Bibles in the language commonly spoken." These 22 men worked an average of 7 1/2 months during the year and distributed a total of 8,641 Bibles, Testaments and Portions.

All of these colporteurs were appointed and worked under the supervision of a local church of the area, and in cooperation with the Bible Society office.

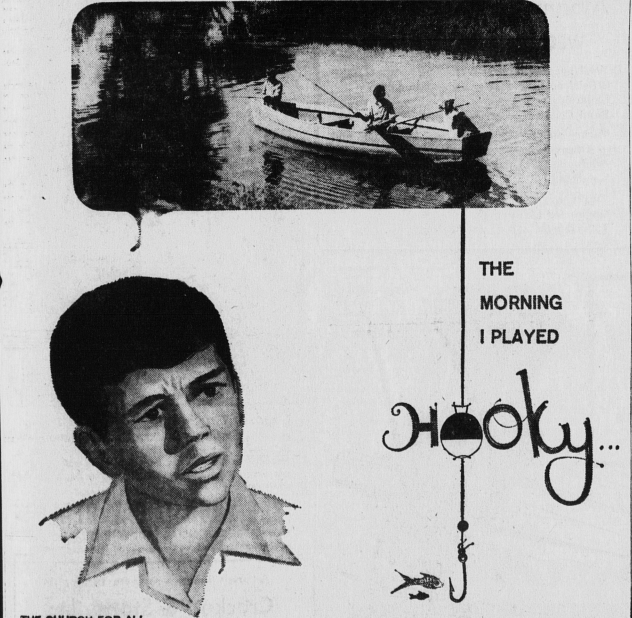
## Country Church In Hollywood Slightly Unique

 HOLLYWOOD (AP)—For 30 years the Country Church in Hollywood has dispensed its odd-time religion, and it's still going strong. You'll find it not many steps from Hollywood and Vine, yet when you enter the grounds, you are shaded by palm trees, cypresses and pine trees, the dis of the city seems far away. As you enter the white-stepped church, you are transported to another, simpler area.

At services on Sunday morning and evening and prayer meetings Wednesday night the rafters ring with the sounds of gospel singing and the word of the Lord. It is spoken by Rev. Rudy Atwood.

Martha Hogg, daughter of the founder and member of the board of trustees, said proudly of the building, modeled after a small church in Ashland, Tenn. "My father had visited as a circuit rider. He was William Bennett Hogg, a high school principal in Mississippi until he entered the service of God. He became a Methodist minister, served as chaplain with the U.S. Army during the First World War. Hogg returned to the ministry, but in 1928 suffered a nervous breakdown and was committed to a veterans hospital for two years. After his recovery he turned to evangelism, first peering at large labor camps in Chicago and Los Angeles. It was here that he found himself without a job, and he suggested to radio station KEAC a program about a country pastor. The minister and his wife became known as Josiah and Sarah Hogg, and their program was a local favorite through it he saw the fulfillment of a dream.
