THE CANADA PACIFIC.—The following is an Ottawa despatch to the Quebec Chronicle:—"It is said that the reason of Sir Charles Tupper's delay in going to Manitoba and the probability of his visiting England is that for some time past the Government has been in treaty with the representatives of a syndicate of English capitalists, who are now in Ottawa with a view of forming a company with \$20,000,000 capital to build the whole Pacific Railway, the Government giving a land subsidy of 50,000,000 or 60,000,000 acres and taking no further responsibility. The negotiations are said to be very nearly completed and Sir Charles is only awaiting advices from the other side before going to England to ratify the agreement with the principals whose agents are now here."

NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

MONTREAL, July.

At three o'clock this morning the Welland Canal repairs were completed and vessels are now being locked through.

QUEBEC, July 5.

Several notables are in the city. Sir Leopold McClintock, of Halifax, Admiral Commanding Her Majesty's North Atlantic Squadron, and Lady McClintock, arrived yesterday.

Mr. and Mrs. J. S. C. Wurtele and Mr. Lefavro, Consul General of France at Quebec, sailed by the mail steamship for Europe on Saturday last.

MONTREAL, July 5.

Mr. Wurtele, Q. C., of this city, left last evening for France, to complete his scheme for a Credit Foncier of this Province with \$250,000,000 capital.

Alderman Demovon has taken action against the New York Sleeping Car Co. for \$5,000 damages, for removing him from a berth for which he had paid.

Dr. Hammond, a native of this city, who appropriated \$15,000 of his wife's money in Minneapolis and then eloped with another lady, has been traced to this city, and is being searched for by the police.

TORONTO, July 5.

On Saturday afternoon a fight took place in York Township between two gardeners named McFarlane and Williams, in which the latter was struck on the head with a cedar post and is now suffering from compression of the brain. McFarlane has been arrested and will probably be tried on Wednesday.

It is expected that Mr. J. K. Kerr will be the Reform candidate for West Toronto, Mr. Angus Morrison the Independent candidate, and Mayor Beatty the Conservative Candidate.

OTTAWA, July 5.

Sir Leonard Tilley, Minister of Finance, will lay the corner stone of the new Methodist Church at Morrisburgh, Tuesday, July 6th.

Sir Alexander Campbell has returned to the city. Lady Macdonald returned to the city from River du Loup last night. She will remain until Sir John is ready to leave for the season.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 5.

A stormy meeting was held at the Sand Lot to-day, the Greenback and Democratic wing of the working men assembling in close proximity. There was a cross fire of cheers and groans, and at the close the Democratic faction made a rush for Kearney amid cries of "hang him." He was protected by the police, hustled into a hack and driven off.

C. B. Howard, a veteran of the Mexican war, confined in Mercer Jail for drunkenness, set the building on fire yesterday and was fatally burned.

NEW YORK, July 5.

Independence day was celebrated in about the usual manner, but quietly. Excursions and meetings were the chief features.

The heaviest rain storm of this season occurred late this afternoon, interfering with the fireworks, though the storm had apparently ceased at night.

BOSTON, July 5.

Independence Day was celebrated in this city with great eclat. An immense number of visitors are in the city. The rowing and sailing regattas attracted immense throngs.

LONDON, July 5.

The report of the Commissioner, to enquire into the Tay disaster states that the fall of the bridge was owing to the insufficiency of the cross bracing, and severely condemns the way in which the bridge was built and the subsequent neglect of proper supervision.

Bradlaugh has instructed his solicitor to take the necessary steps to defend him in legal proceedings against him.

There is great excitement in sporting circles owing to the persistent rumor that objection will be made to Bend Or (winner of Derby) on the ground that he is not Bend Or but "Tadcaster" the matter is being fully investigated.

CONSTANTINOPLE, July 5.

A fugitive slave demanding asylum, has been received at the British embassy.

It is rumored that Mr. Goschen, the British ambassador, will demand the dismissal of Aheadin Pasha, Minister of Foreign Affairs, in consequence of intrigues for fermenting Albanian resistance.

PARIS, July 5.

A duel was fought to-day between M. Goddenki, editor of the Union and Camille Pelletier, editor of La Justice, Radical. Pelletier received a thrust through the thigh.
