

Maritime Midget Title Is Captured By Abbies

Harry Sentner's Charlottetown Abbies captured the Maritime Midget hockey crown at Saint Dunstan's University rink here Saturday whipping the other finalist, Halifax Monarchs, 11-3 before about 300 delighted fans.

Abbies entered the third period leading 3-1 but they proceeded to break the affair wide open with a sparkling eight goal barrage. The Nova Scotians couldn't do a thing to stop the onslaught of the new Brunswick-Prince Edward Island champions who tore in on goalie Beazley almost at will. At that the visitors picked up a brace of tallies, their best period production of the night but it still left them far behind the new Maritime champs.

Abbies took a 2-1 lead in the first stanza on goals by David Lee and Wayne Ward, made it 3-1 in the middle frame on Billy MacMillan's solo effort and then broke the contest wide open in the closing twenty minutes.

Halifax played their best hockey in the opening period and it was only the fine goaltending of young Edie Tierney that held them to a single marker. Tierney continued his good work the rest of the distance but the pressure grew lighter as the game progressed.

Billy MacMillan, Wayne Ward and David Lee each fired three goals for the Abbies with Stan Pearson collecting the other two. Joe MacNeill and Don Brown were the Monarchs' marksmen with MacNeill sinking two.

Eight penalties, all minors, were called by referees Maurice Goodwin and Hal Lewis. Each team drew four.

Chicago White Sox and San Francisco Giants stood all alone Sunday as the only teams without a defeat at the end of the first weekend of major league baseball.

The White Sox, aided by clutch relief pitching of rookie Rudy Arias and sophomore Bob Shaw, defeated Detroit Tigers 5-3 for a sweep of their three-game series.

The Giants overcame a 3-0 first-inning deficit to whip St. Louis Cardinals 6-3 for a sweep of their three-game set. Felipe Alou's two-run homer in the ninth clinched the victory for San Francisco.

Only one other game was played in each of the American and National Leagues. Defending champion New York Yankees, after two postponements, finally opened their season and defeated Boston Red Sox 3-2 at Yankee Stadium.

Action Shifts to Toronto

Provost Stars in Habs' 3-1 Victory Over Leafs

MONTREAL (CP) — Worn on ice and as a power-play killer, riddled in two three-period goals Saturday night to give Montreal Canadiens a 3-1 win over Toronto Maple Leafs and set up a 2-0 lead for Montreal in the best-of-seven Stanley Cup final.

It was a rugged, bitterly fought game, with standout work by goalie Johnny Bower of the Leafs and Jacques Plante of Montreal. Bower in particular came up with some big saves in the first two periods.

The game was rougher but a better playoff spectacle than Thursday's opener, won 5-3 by Canadiens. The Leafs drew nine of the 17 minor penalties called by Referee Frank Udvari.

The series now shifts to Toronto for games Tuesday and Thursday.

OPENS SCORING
Tom Johnson scored for Montreal in the first period, while two Leafs and one Montrealer were in the penalty box. Ron Stewart got the goal back for Toronto in the second period.

Defenceman Doug Harvey, again playing a strong, cagey game, figured in both goals that made Provost the scoring hero of the night for 14,518 Montreal fans.

The back-nosed rightwinger, who skates with his legs far apart, had a clear shot both times. He hit the target for the winning goal

at 5:02 of the final period and again at 16:33 for the insurance marker.

What was viewed as the turning point of the game came near the 15-minute mark of the last period, with Montreal leading 2-1. Plante waddled far out of his net trying to trap a rebound off the end boards.

He missed. Brian Cullen of the Leafs, with a gaping net in front of him, shot wide. Plante said afterwards he just managed to get the toe of his stick on the puck as Cullen fired.

Coach Tom Blake did a fancy job of juggling his so-called second line. He started the game with Henri Richard at centre and big brother Maurice, the 37-year-old Rocket, and Don Marshall on the wings. At times the older Rocket gave way to Bernie Geoffrion, Henri to Ralph Backstrom and Marshall to Ab McDonald.

The younger Richard took his regular turn with his usual ineptness—Dickie Moore and Marcel Bonin.

It was the Rocket's first since he was sidelined by an injury in mid-season.

Johnson was anchor man on the power play when he opened the scoring at 5:12 of the first period, his partly screened shot flying past Bower.

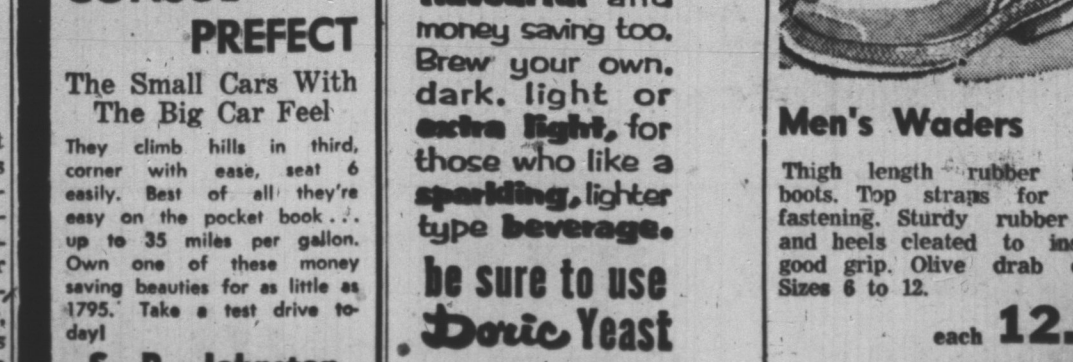
