Special Service At Montague Church

...An outstanding W.M.S. thank offering service was held at Trinity United Church, Montague, on Sunday evening, April 26th, when the speaker was Rev. J. M. Fraser, minister of the church. Rev. Fraser took his texts from Matthew 13, "The Field is the World", and Ephesians 2, "Now ye are no more strangers and foreigners, but fellow citizens". This address on home missions pictured the work carried on at ports such as Halifax where representatives of the church meet the ships at the dock to welcome immigrants coming to Canada.

These new Canadians have suffered persecution under Hitler in Germany and other European countries, and as many of them are unable to speak or understand the language, to be greeted by a deaconess or other representative of the church, who can speak several languages and interpret for these strangers must be of great encouragement.

The newcomers are served coffee and doughnuts, clothing or other necessities distributed where needed, and they are directed to trains which take them to their destination.

Mr. Fraser brought his message to a close by quoting the following poem, composed by Miss Aleen Ratz, for several years a part worker representing the United Church of Canada in Halifax, who, with her ability to speak five languages, was well qualified to welcome immigrants of different races and languages to Canada:

"I saw two ships a-sailing, A-sailing on the sea, And oh, they were all laden With wondrous folks for me. There were Frenchmen in the cabins, Much baggage in the holds.
