New Marketing Agency For Nova Scotia Apples
KENTVILLE, N.S. (CP)—Nova Scotia Apples Ltd., a new marketing agency which threatened to fold when it did not receive full support in this prolific Annapolis Valley apple country, announced Thursday night it is preparing to market 1,500,000 bushels of apples this year.

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The agency was given the backing of the United Fruit Companies of Nova Scotia, and the chairman of the new agency immediately announced plans to carry on. Col. R. H. Shaw said the agency assured of handling 1,500,000 bushels, about 70 per cent of the expected total crop.

Col. Shaw said following a meeting of the agency's directors Thursday that the enthusiastic support received from all parts of the valley "provided ample grounds for carrying on with the original plans, in the opinion of the directors."

The United Fruit Companies, which pledged support, includes about 50 per cent of the valley's apple growers. And officials said there are "many other substantial growers."
