THE CENSUS.

It is reported that the Dominion Statistician, Mr. Johnston, is to be supplanted in the taking of the next census by Mr. Archibald Blue, of the Ontario Bureau of Mines. We see no good cause for this change. Mr. Johnston's work has been well done. The last census, that of 1891, was the most reliable ever taken in Canada. Canadians residing in the United States and elsewhere were not counted in with the population of Canada and there was no "duplication." It is to be hoped that the reported change of superintendent is not to be followed by a change in the principle and method of taking the census. A fair start was made in 1891; each decennial enumeration ought to be made upon the same plan.

LORD ROBERTS' PLAN.

LORD ROBERTS is now on the way to Middleburg on the Delagoa Bay Railway. He left Pretoria and Johannesburg under a strong guard. The Boers have attempted to thwart his plans by raids west and north of Pretoria and to hold him by hanging to his flank, just as they did when he left Bloemfontein to go to Pretoria. To-day's despatches show that he is making substantial progress, although the winter weather of the Transvaal has been stormy and severe upon men and animals. Lord Roberts will strike for the gateway of the Lydenburg district, leaving Lord Methuen and General Baden-Powell to suppress the raiders in the western district and General Broadwood to pursue Dewett.

SIGNIFICANT!

It is remarked that the discreet old Liberals in Parliament [are quietly retiring from the political field. For instance, Speaker Bain has retired in disgust; Mr. Livingston, of Waterloo, has refused a nomination; Mr. Snetsinger, of Cornwall, is out of it; Mr. Britton, of Kingston, will not run, as it would be lost labor; Mr. Somerville, of Brant, has been out of harmony with the ruling faction, and has finally been one out of his constituency by Mr. Patterson; Dr. Landerkin goes, also,—and so the list increases. Mowat and Joly have retired from the Cabinet, and Cartwright has been reduced to the position of an onlooker. Meanwhile Tarte is master of the administration, and Blair and Sifton continue to make deals. As the Mail and Empire remarks: "These influences are the antitheses of Reform; they stand for everything the reformers condemned, but in an exaggerated form."

A CONDITION BROKEN,

The first Liberal tariff contained what was called a "reciprocal clause," applicable to all nations complying with the conditions. But this couldn't be carried into operation. The Government had to amend the clause in order to meet the objections raised at the outset by Sir Charles Tupper. It was, on the strength of the declaration that they were giving no preference to Great Britain that the Premier, while in England, received and accepted the Cobden medal.—Lord Farrar declaring when he conferred it that "if we thought you intended, and your proposition meant a preference to England

over other countries, we would not be here to honor you upon this occasion." But the condition upon which the medal was accepted was violated. Ere long Sir Wilfrid and his Government took credit for giving Great Britain a special preference in our markets; and they obtained for Canada's products in the British markets no preference at all!

PREFERENTIAL TRADE.

The tortuous course of the Government with regard to this important question was traced a short time ago by the Hon. D. Ferguson, in the Senate. The value of a mutual preference as between Great Britain and Canada and the British possessions throughout the world is clear to all. Shortly before the last general election Sir Wilfrid Laurier said:

"That practical statesman, Mr. Joseph Chamberlain, has come to the conclusion that the time has come when it is possible to have within the bonds of the Empire a new step taken which will give the colonies, in England, a preference for their products over the products of other nations. What would be the possibilities of such a step if it were taken? We sell our goods in England. We send our wheat, our butter, our cheese, all our natural products; but there we have to compete with similar products from the United States, from Russia, and from other nations. Just see what a great advantage it would be to Canada if the wheat, cheese and butter, which we would send to England should be met in England with a preference over similar products of other nations. The possibilities are immense. I would be in a far better position to obtain this boon for Canada than Sir Charles Tupper, because his is a protective tariff, whereas mine is a revenue tariff, pure and simple, and Mr. Chamberlain says that is all that is necessary in order to obtain it. My hope is, may, my conviction is, that on the 23rd of June the Liberal party will be at the head of the poll, and then it will be the Liberal party that will send commissioners to London to arrange for the basis of preferential trade."

Senator Ferguson described the subsequent course of the Government led by the gentleman who spoke these words. They didn't send commissioners home to England. Sir Wilfrid himself "went home" at the time of the Queen's Jubilee and himself, disclaimed the idea of a preference such as that which he assured the people of Canada he would obtain! We are not of those who object to a trade preference in favor of Great Britain. The amazing part of the business is that Sir Wilfrid gave up entirely the idea of obtaining for Canada the preference in the British markets which he declared that he could obtain more easily than Sir Charles Tupper. "What we give you by our tariff" said Sir Wilfrid to the people of England, "we give you in gratitude for the splendid freedom under which we have prospered. It is a free gift. We ask no compensation." In the face of this declaration, Mr. Chamberlain found it impossible to reciprocate the preference given by Canada or even to touch it with a pair of tongs,—and so we are until this day without the preference in the British market of which Sir Wilfrid, before the election truly said "the possibilities are immense."

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

Several years ago a cipher code book disappeared from the State Department at Washington. It is considered possible that this fell into the hands of the Chinese Government, and may account for the doubtful telegrams lately received from Mr. Conger.

The 'Record,' of London, states that after the news of the murder of missionaries in China reached England, no fewer than thirty clergymen of the diocese of Durham offered themselves for foreign service. This shows that there is great spiritual life and a spirit of consecration in the Church of England.

It is also evident, says the Montreal Gazette, that the Laurier Government will not in that way get what it wants. The Parliament of Canada will have to speak before the Parliament of Great Britain will make it anything but what it is.
