## STILL COLD, WET

# Sun may Shine Over Weekend

A cold front is expected to break through on Sunday today, and the day that the "sun does" may continue to be the theme for the next few days, as it has been for the past two weeks.

Long range forecasts indicate that there would "not be much improvement until Sunday," with showers forecast for today, and perhaps for Sunday.

There was no actual rainfall in the city until evening and rain was reported in several places in Kings County. Highest temperature recorded was 56 degrees, with the lowest at 53. Warren Burns at the Experimental Farm reported. Only two days this month have seen the mercury over 65 degrees, he added.

## HOURS OF SUNSHINE

Hours of sunshine for the month now total 287, at opposite to the monthly average of 263, and 4.36 inches of rain have fallen to date.

When a break in the weather does come, the sunshine will be a welcome sight for farmers and tourist officials, for whom the wet cold days have meant a setback in crops and the tourist business.

Stewart Wright, deputy minister of agriculture, said yesterday that he had not heard many actual reports of crop loss, although strawberry growers are concerned about rotting. Reports Thursday stated that in some fields, fruit rot was affecting as high as 30 per cent of the berries.

Some loss was showing up in the tobacco crop, he said, with plants rotting off at the top of the ground. Tobacco is a plant requiring hot dry weather.

Weeds are having a field day, and conditions make it impossible to get into the fields to cultivate.

## Liberal Party Said Planning For Action In Late Summer

Although activities of the Liberal Party in the province appear to have been quiet for the past month, it was learned from a prominent Liberal organizer that organizational work is being carried out with a view to holding nominating conventions, on both federal and provincial levels, "in about a month — probably between August 15 and September 15."

A Prince County Liberal organization meeting has been called for next Wednesday in O'Leary, when the groundwork for convention dates in the county will be laid.

The Liberal source said that "conventions will not be held for provincial and federal seats 'till a number will be held in the next month or so.'"

Officials for the proposed shopping centre project are "looking forward to meeting with city council on Monday afternoon," the source said, "and a decision on the rezoning of the Belvedere Avenue section of the city, Frederic A. Large, QC, attorney for the project said yesterday.

A recommendation against rezoning the area was presented to the council on Monday night of this week by the town planning committee. Such rezoning would allow for the construction of three major buildings: the shopping centre, a bowling alley and a bottling plant.

Mr. Large emphasized that it is not a matter of a "bigging" centre people coming here, but a wish to put to use land on which an project is already held, and the project could be a shopping centre or something else.

Robert D. Manville, of the shopping centre firm, is conducting explorations on the matter, and said yesterday that he has spoken with town planning commissioner Walter De Silva regarding the use of the 32-acre tract, and alternative thoughts as to other things for which the site could be used besides a shopping centre.

There may be other suggestions for the use of the land," Mr. Large said, "and it may be that the shopping centre could proceed on a smaller scale, with a cornerstone approach, as there seems to be general approval of the need for grocery stores and other services in the locality.

PRIMARY DESIRE  
The primary desire is to have a project located in this section that will meet the needs of the people and comply with the regulations, he said.

Approaches have been made by numerous people to have the proposed shopping centre located elsewhere, but no commitments will be made until all the possibilities of the present land in question have been exhausted, he said. "A lot of things can be done with 32 acres of land."

Both Mr. Large and Mr. Manville will attend the meeting with city council.

Sorrow once more entered the homes of Murray Harbour North and surrounding communities on Thursday, June 29th, 1961, when it was learned that after a brief illness James Herbert Llewellyn in his 72nd year had passed peacefully away at the home of his daughter in Summerside, P.E.I.

Son of Benjamin Llewellyn and his wife, Henrietta Dixon. Herbert was born at Gaspereau, P.E.I., on August 4th, 1889. He was united in marriage to Annie Florence Irving on August 23rd, 1911. On the occasion of their Golden Wedding Day last August, their family, friends, and neighbours called to offer congratulations and warm wishes.

Herbert chose the life of a lobster fisherman and for 54 years he followed the sea. The fellowship of his family and friends was his greatest enjoyment in life.
