CHEAP FARES.—Special attention is directed to the advertisement of the steamers Carroll and Worcester. The fare from Charlottetown to Boston has been reduced to \$4, and the \$6 return tickets have been made good for the balance of the season.

DOG TAX.—Fourteen persons were summoned to the Stipendiary Magistrate's court this forenoon for non-payment of dog tax. Eleven paid the amount of tax and cost of summons before their cases were called; and judgment for tax and court expenses was given against the remaining three.

FOR ST. JOHN'S.—The steamer Coban, Capt. Robert Fraser, which arrived here from Montreal yesterday morning with a general cargo, proceeded to St. John's, Nfld., this afternoon with sheep, cattle, horses, etc., on board. The Coban has been thoroughly repaired since the recent accident, and is now a better boat than ever.

POLE VAULTING.—A pole vaulting contest for the championship of the Maritime Provinces, will take place in the Drill Shed, on Wednesday evening next, between James McEachern, of Charlottetown, and Marcus Henderson, of Clyde River. The men are pretty evenly matched, and a close and exciting contest is expected.

DOMINION ILLUSTRATED.—Late numbers of the Dominion Illustrated hardly fulfill the promise of the first. The illustrations are, however, interesting to Canadians, and some portions of the letter-press are excellent. SCOT ACT IN TROUB.—The Truro Guardian says: A renewed effort is being made to revive the movement for the repeal of the Scott Act in this county. We believe it will be in the interests of morality and temperance to push the movement forward to a successful issue.

CITY PROPERTY FOR SALE.—The engine houses and land on Grafton and King streets, three building lots at head of Queen street, and the house and land on Bayfield street, will be offered in auction on the 5th November next, by R. Beattie. The sale will begin at the engine house on Grafton street, at eleven o'clock in the forenoon.

CRICK.—The crossing for Weymouth Street, near King Square, is not yet forthcoming, although promised some time ago. Neither have the loose planks in the sidewalk on Grafton Street, between Hillsborough and Weymouth Streets, been spiked down. A much interested public are anxious to know why these things have not been attended to long ere this.

KICKED BY A HORSE.—The six-year old son of Rev. Mr. Crisp was kicked in the head by a horse, on Thursday night last, at Point De Bute, N. B. The skull was fractured, and the brain exposed. The little fellow was in the yard alone with the horse, when some member of the family, hearing a cry, went out and found him unconscious. There is little hope of his surviving the accident.

THE SHORT LINE.—Rapid progress is being made with construction on the Short Line. Rails are now laid a distance of ten miles from Pictou, and before four weeks elapses the locomotive will be at River John. The contractors have over 600 men employed and have pushed ahead the work with rapidity. The expenditure of money in connection with this road has been a good thing for the town of Pictou.

THE GAR.—The three mile race for a purse of \$300 between Daniel Galanaugh and Harry Vail, of St. John, takes place on the Kennebec basin, this afternoon, weather permitting. Both men are very clever with the oar, having taken part in many amateur and professional contests in the past few years. Galanaugh is 30 years of age, 5 feet 11 inches in height, and rows at 155 pounds. He is a native of Portland, St. John, but for the past ten years has lived in Philadelphia. Vail is 27 years old, weighs 145 lbs, and rows at 152 lbs.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER. Trouble Feared. WINNIPEG, Man., Oct. 21. There is likely to be serious trouble over the crossing of the Northern Pacific's Portage extension over the C. P. R. Yesterday Supt. White, of the C. P. R., had about 150 men on guard to prevent the Northern Pacific employes from crossing their track. About 400 citizens went from here on a special to see the work completed, but had to return disappointed. They threaten to go out again to-morrow and compel the C. P. R. contingent to allow the crossing to be made. Troops have been called out for fear of disturbance. There is great excitement here to-day.

Died at Sea. HALIFAX, Oct. 21. The Gloucester schooner Puritan has arrived at Canso from Grand Banks in charge of mate Daniel McDonald, with the corpse of Captain Lawrence O'Brien on board, who died on the 14th inst., under peculiar circumstances. On the fourteenth he was left alone in charge of the vessel, while the crew went to attend to the trawls. When the first dory returned they found the Captain in great agony. While on the lookout for the dories he lost sight of two, and fearing their occupants had been drowned, became terribly nervous. One hour later he died.

Under Police Surveillance. MONTREAL, Oct. 21. The doctors will make their report on the post mortem examination of the body of the girl Genevieve at the inquest Monday. They have found a large wound on the breast and another on the side which they say must have been made with a blunt instrument. There are also several severe bruises. This is the girl who was so badly treated by nine young men that she died from the effects. Those who are implicated are under police surveillance.

The Jesuits' Claim. MONTREAL, Oct. 20. It is stated that Premier Mercier has received a communication from Rome informing him that the Pope has given decision in the allotment of \$400,000 for the settlement of the Jesuit estate question to the effect that three fourths of the amount shall revert to the Jesuits and the rest to Cardinal Taschereau and Laval University.

All in the Family. NEW YORK, Oct. 21. Col. Ingersoll, Gen. Prior and Gen. McMahon are about to bring suit on behalf of Mrs. Jas. G. Blaine, Jr., against James G. Blaine, Sr., and wife for \$100,000 for alienating young Blaine's affections. Mrs. Blaine, Jr., does not sue for divorce, because she is a Catholic, and divorce is not tolerated by the church.

Arrested for Forgery. HALIFAX, Oct. 21. Salter G. Noble, formerly a member of the fish exporting firm of Levi Hart & Co., is under arrest for forging the name of Geo. Nichols, his father-in-law, to a note. Noble denies the charge.

Another Title. LONDON, Oct. 20. It is officially announced that Lord Dufferin has received the titles of Marquis of Dufferin and Earl of Ava.

Agitating. HALIFAX, Oct. 21. The people of Pictou town are agitating for the establishment of a joint stock boot and shoe factory.

Lord Stanley visited Niagara Falls a few days ago. It is said that the honor of introducing Methodism into Boston belongs to Rev. Wm. Hall, of Nova Scotia. Hon. Samuel Chipman, of Cornwallis, N.S., was 99 years old on the 18th, and is said to be the oldest Freeman in the world, having been initiated in 1817. Mr. Robert Young, representing Messrs. J. R. Woodburn & Co., Confectioners, St. John, N. B., is on a business trip to the Island. He is at the Hotel Davies. Mr. Charles H. Porter, of Halifax, the popular representative of the Canada Life Insurance Company, is on one of his business trips to the Island. He is registered at the Osborne. Mayor Grant, of Victoria, B. C., has instituted criminal proceedings against the proprietors of the Colonist for publishing a letter which asked some rather pointed questions about the defalcations of the absconded city treasurer. The St. John Gazette says it is rumored that the Centenary church have invited the Rev. Ralph Brecken, who is at present on a trip to Europe for his health, to succeed Rev. Mr. Brewer. An answer is expected on Mr. Brecken's return. It is stated that John Finucane, M. P. for East Lunenburg, will bring a suit against the Times, for libel, for stating that in a speech he advised the farmers in Ireland not to refuse to shoe land-grabbers' horses but to shoe them and drive nails into the quick. It is reported by the Ottawa Citizen that Premier Mowat, of Ontario, is about to wrap his cloak around him and gracefully retire from the political stage, to be succeeded by Mr. Samuel Blake, Q. C., an Attorney-General, and by Mr. Gibson, of Hamilton, as head of the Government. Gladstone is to be photographed when he delivers his great oration at Birmingham, the stronghold of Chamberlain, and the speech will be re-produced with its exact intonation in different parts of the United Kingdom. The grand old man's address is awaited with great interest, as an important effort to convince the dissentient Liberals of the folly of their course. The Boston Transcript says that the bride-maid of 1849 will be a Frenchified looking woman, for the aesthetic style has quite departed and is replaced by the tight coat of satin, with pearl and silver brooch. The waist-coats are of brocade, the figure representing very small but very bright knots of flowers. The effect of masquerading is still preserved, however, and bridesmaids look artificial and shall it be said—affected. The Seattle Post Intelligencer states that Captain Solomon Jacobs, owner of the schooners Mollie Adams and Edward E. Webster, formerly of Gloucester, has shipped East this season halibut realizing a gross return of \$33,000.
