During the first 10 months of this year, tax collectors have increased by nearly \$200,000, as a result of early budgeting, John Butler, City Comptroller, said Saturday.

Pollution Report Due This Month

Dr. Burton Howatt, assistant deputy minister of health, said Saturday, the final report of the survey of pollution of Charlottetown Harbor is expected from the engineers during the third week of Nov. Dr. Howatt said the firm of J. L. Richards and Associates, Ottawa, the consulting engineers making the survey, has stated the complexity of the problem and the work involved in determining satisfactory remedial measures were greater than anticipated and for that reason the report would not be ready for another three weeks.

Mr. Butler said total collections for the first 10 months of 1962 were \$1,123,961, while for this year they had risen to \$1,322,963. Biggest single increase was recorded in real estate tax collections, which rose nearly \$100,000 over last year.

Tax receipts to the end of October this year, with comparable figures for last year in brackets, were: real estate \$509,735 (\$468,426); personal property \$332,713 (\$309,674); educational \$68,077 (\$52,969); arrears \$109,782 (\$84,251); streets and sidewalks \$47,178 (\$8,107); licenses \$4,225 (\$3,322); miscellaneous and interest \$20,645 (\$18,079).
