LONG, LEAN & CLASS-CONSCIOUS ARE P. E. ISLAND-BRED YORKSHIRES

Canadian Press Staff Writer — Prince Edward Island pigs are long and lean and class-conscious. Scientific breeding has made them the upper crust of Canadian swine stock.

Some of the haughtier hogs have pedigrees going back nearly 60 generations, without a flaw in their illustrious names. By 1935, island pigs had attained such quality that no breeding swine anywhere could be found to improve them, and none has been imported since.

Prince Edward Island hogs now are in demand by breeders all over the continent.

THE ISLAND — The Island's super-pigs won the first 11 prizes for bacon at the Royal Winter Fair in Toronto in 1952 and didn't bother to compete last year.

Why keep showing after you beat the world's record? Mr. Clay is proud of the hogs that have come to be the Island's second industry. It was his constant prodding that made farmers develop their pigs until they became the world's best specimens of Yorkshires, the top market breed.

Prince Edward Island has about two-thirds of all Canadian sows qualifying in advance registry, a means of scientific selection designed to produce peerless pigs.

The percentage of grade A carcasses on the island is 57.8, compared to the national average of 26.5. Practically all the 70,000 P. E. I. pigs are Yorkshires.

Young farmers generally start with one or two pigs and some work up to a herd of 30 or 40. Hardly any of the island's 10,000 growers has more than 50.

Only a few farmers put their pigs out to pasture, but many devote three or four acres in their fertile red soil to grain growing. Grain-fed pigs produce the best pork.

In 1950, a record year, 110,000 carcasses were shipped. The average is about 70,000. The industry contributes nearly \$6,000,000 to the island's economy every year from pork and breeding stock. Only potatoes bring in more: about \$10,000,000.

Well-bred Yorkshires don't eat like human beings. The "ult" when they've had enough.

When they reach maturity, usually in 200 days, they lose their appetites and keep their trim figures. They dress at about 150 pounds.

Their carcasses are long, their bacon sweet, and their lard almost non-existent.

Minister Reviews Nationalists Plan Revenge For Sinking

TAIPEH, Formosa (AP) — An intensified vest-pocket war Monday seemed likely as the Chinese Nationalists pledged the "severest blows possible" for the sinking of a destroyer escort by Red torpedo boats.

The pledge was made in the defence ministry's communiqué. It confirmed that 28 of the 180 officers and men of the 1,800-ton Taiping perished Sunday in the engagement off the Tachen islands, 215 miles north of Formosa.

Nationalist planes flew over while rescue ships picked up survivors, but no Chinese Communist planes tried to interfere. Of those rescued, 28 were wounded, nine seriously.

Nationalist officials conferred for hours Monday and there were press reports that "momentous decision had been made. There was speculation that the Nationalists would launch a massive retaliation attack.

Both the press and unofficial quarters were clamoring for counter-attacks to the Communists. The official Chung Hwa Daily News said Russia had given Red China more than 40 torpedo boats and it was assumed some of these had been transferred to the Chu Shan islands, 100 miles north of the Tachen islands.

The Nationalists insist the Communists are building up forces in the Chu Shans for an attack on the Tachens.
