

# Defenceman Howie Young Suspended

MONTREAL (CP)—Howie Young, Chicago Black Hawk defenceman whose promising career has been marred by fights and suspensions, was suspended indefinitely by President Clarence Campbell, chief of the National Hockey League Tuesday.

Young was suspended pending an investigation into his conduct during a game in Toronto last Saturday.

Campbell's brief statement said he will be concerned with Young's conduct in the penalty box near the end of the second period in the game between Toronto Maple Leafs and Black Hawks Leafs Nov. 30.

Young had been given a minor penalty for holding and a major penalty for elbowing. Campbell's statement did not indicate the nature of Young's conduct in the penalty box. However, St. Louis Post-Dispatch, president of Maple Leaf Gardens, said he has filed an official protest with the league.

**ACCUSED OF SPITTING**  
Smythe said Young used untempered language and spat. Smythe also said he had threatened to referee-in-chief Carl Vos.

Young got an NHL record for penalty minutes with 273 last season. He drew a three-game suspension for throwing his stick at referee Frank Udvari and was suspended by Detroit Red Wings for failure to show up at a players' meeting. The Chicago team traded him to the Chicago 42nd summer for goalie Roger Crozier.

Young, 26, 62 centimeters, was suspended by Detroit for drawing needless penalties in the same year. He was taken off the Wings' active list for twice missing practice. However, he had to show up at an old Toronto native was suspended by Rochester Americans of the American League for conduct detrimental to the best interests of the club.

**Athletic Ass'n Holds Meeting**  
A meeting of the Prince Edward Island Inter-school Athletic Association executive was held at Saint Dunstan's on Thursday with all but one member of the executive in attendance. A number of physical education teachers attended as guests.

The agenda consisted of a report on fall term sports, awards, the appointment of referees-in-chief for basketball and hockey, eligibility, ice sports, scheduling and financial policy.

The following were officially declared as provincial interschool athletic winners in fall term sports: Senior boys' football, Saint Dunstan's High School; Senior girls' football, St. Michael's Regional High School; Senior boys' soccer, St. Michael's Regional High School; Senior girls' soccer, St. Michael's Regional High School; Junior "A" soccer, Summerside High School; Elementary soccer for both girls and boys, Air Marshal Johnson School; Cross country, St. Michael's Regional High School.

The awards committee recommended the new awards system which will place the responsibility for trophies on the department of physical education, a standard provincial interschool banner for each sport on the same day as the award. Individual schools concerned. Ed Hilton was reappointed as referee-in-chief for basketball and Brian Lewis was appointed as referee-in-chief for hockey.

On the matter of eligibility it was decided to again permit players to play for both IAA and the MAHA but not with the AAL. However, players will not be permitted to compete in MAHA eliminations and playoffs before commencing their interschool play.

The provincial ice sports were held in Summerside, 1964. The Queen's School Meet will be held in Charlottetown, the Prince County Meet in Summerside, and the King's County Meet in either Souris or Montague.

On the matter of scheduling it was decided that the Senior "B" interschool basketball tournament for both girls and boys would be held in Montserrat on March 21, and that all zone schedules would be completed by March 14. Zone playdowns in hockey all year brackets will be completed by Feb. 22. Interzone playdowns by March 14 and finals by March 21.

Zone representatives are to submit a schedule of zone playdowns to complete the interzone playdowns and final tournament for both girls and boys. The girls' zone playdowns will be held in the winter at a date to be scheduled later.

KANSAS CITY (AP)—Owner Charles W. Finley of Kansas City Athletics is considering a lawsuit against other American League owners to force them to approve his proposal to move the club to Louisville, Ky.
