LAST REVENUE IN NEW SOUTH WALES.—The value of the public lands of the colony as a source of revenue is illustrated by the fact that during the period 1888-93 no less than £13,335,825 was obtained from auction sales, conditional leases, pastoral occupation, mining occupation, and miscellaneous receipts; the annual amount ranging from £2,268,353 in 1888 to £2,137,563 in 1889. The quantity of land allowed to be sold each year is limited by statute.

FIRST METHODIST CHURCH.—Rev. George M. Campbell, the new incumbent of the First Methodist Church, occupied the pulpit on both occasions yesterday. His manner is very pleasing, his language eloquent and his arguments convincing. He asked the co-operation of the whole congregation in all moral and religious movements, and expressed a desire to be fully acquainted with his parishioners and visit them personally as soon as possible.

STEAMER LAUNCHED.—The ferry steamer, built at Moncton for the Local Government, by Mr. Angus McDonald, of Pisiquid, was launched on Saturday in the presence of a large number of people. Her length is 115 feet, breadth of beam 24 feet 9 inches, and depth of hold 5 feet 2 inches. She is fastened with copper and galvanized iron, and is sheathed with yellow metal up to six feet draft of water. Her boiler and engine will be put in by McKinnon & McLean.

AN OUTDOOR WEDDING.—Miss Ada Hill, of Hyde Park, Mass., and Mr. Geo. Dennis, of Nova Scotia, brother of Mr. William Dennis, of the Halifax Herald, were united in marriage at DeLham, Mass., one afternoon last week. The ceremony was performed in the open air at Washburn's Grove, Green Lodge, DeLham, and was the notable event of the summer season in that town. The bridal party stood on a very carpet of fragrant ferns, under an arch of flowers and foliage, from which swung the floral wedding bell.

SAVATION ARMY.—There was a large attendance last night at the Salvation Army. Yesterday afternoon they marched out to the Park, headed by the Halifax Army Band, whose good playing drew a large crowd, that listened so attentively while an open air service was held. The meeting at night in the hall was very impressive and profitable. A great many remained for the prayer meeting, and two went forward as seekers of salvation. To-night Essie Hart, who is in charge of the rescue work, will speak and give an account of the good work which is being done in these homes for the fallen. They receive girls from any of the provinces. We understand some have gone from Charlottetown, of whom the organ men give a good account. There will be an admission of 10 cents at the door, which is to be devoted to the carrying out of the work. As this is a very worthy object, we repeat for the good of those who were present last night, a good time may be expected, as a good programme of music and singing has been prepared.
