

Working Class Students Reported Fewer In College

By **BRENDA LARGE**. OTTAWA (CP) — Students from working-class families are greatly under-represented at Canadian universities, says a report released here by the Canadian Union of Students. A survey of student means by Robert Robinson, the report says 48 per cent of 7,611 students questioned in universities across the country gave their father's occupation as professional, proprietary or managerial.

Only 35 per cent of those questioned gave their father's occupation as among the so-called "blue collar" jobs. The remaining 17 per cent listed other occupations such as farming, mining, logging and fishing.

Thus, the study says, high-income "white collar" families, which make up less than one quarter of the Canadian population—23.3 per cent—send nearly half of all students to the 47 Canadian universities and colleges surveyed in February, 1965.

CONTRACT BRIDGE

North dealer. Both sides vulnerable.

NORTH
♠ QJ4

The bidding:
North East South West
1♠ Pass 1♠ Pass
3♠ Pass 3♠ Pass
5♠ Pass 6♠

Opening lead—king of diamonds.

Even if you and your favorite partner bid exceedingly well, you are bound to undertake at least some contracts which are absolutely hopeless.

However, you are expected to make some of these contracts—by whatever means that suggest themselves to you. This ability to steal hands is certainly a legitimate part of the game. Deception—honest deception, that is—belongs in every declarer's repertoire, and swindling the opponents out of their due is one of the most satisfying rewards there is in bridge.

Take this case where South made six spades. Obviously, he should have gone down one; the defenders had two ironclad tricks in the form of the A-K of trumps.

Of course, South knew this when he started to play the hand, but he also realized that the opponents were unaware of the situation. It was highly improbable that either defender had the A-K of trumps; presumably that defender would have doubled six spades in such case.

Assuming that the trump honors were divided, South proceeded to lay a trap which he hoped the opponents would fall into.

He ruffed the diamond lead in dummy and cashed the A-K of hearts. When he now played the queen of hearts, East ruffed with the seven, which South overruffed with the eight.

Declarer now trumped another diamond in dummy, cashed the A-K of clubs—on which he discarded his last diamond—and then led the queen of spades. East had to play the ace and West the king, and the outcome was that South made six spades.

Of course, it is easy to criticize East for failing to discard on the third heart or for failing to ruff with the ace, but the fact is that many players holding the East cards would have done exactly the same. Perhaps the fairest thing to do is give South credit for having devised a simple but effective scheme to steal the contract.


