**Dates For Quick Energy
And Delectable Brownies**

"IT'S PEAK season for fresh dates from California," I told the Chef. "They are often called candy fruit because they contain from 60 percent to 65 percent sugar."

"Is that why they are classified as an energy food?" asked the Chef.

"Basically, yes but also because the date contains a form of fruit sugar that is quickly absorbed by the body, transformed into energy and used at once. If one is fatigued, a five-minute relaxation and rest, followed by a cup of clear tea and three fresh dates enjoyed slowly, usually proves very refreshing."

"But Madame, is this also good for reducing?" questioned the Chef. "It was under the impression that dates are very high in calories."

"Three to four medium-sized pitted dates, fresh or dried, contain only 85 calories. Chef. In accordance with the reducing diet idea of small meals with snacks between and before retiring, a few dates will prove helpful. They should be listed in the total calories for the day."

"Dates also provide roughage and in the vitamin and mineral category thiamine, riboflavin, niacin, iron and valuable copper need only in small amounts; but essential to body chemistry."

The toast to the bride was proposed by Mr. Peterson in which the groom responded. Telegrams were read by the groomsmen.

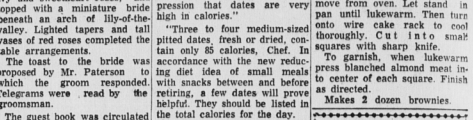
The guest book was circulated by Mrs. Percy Stein, sister of the bride.

GOLDEN DATE BROWNIES

1 1/2 cup butter or margarine

1 cup brown sugar, packed down

2 large eggs

3/4 cup sifted flour

1/4 cup baking soda

1/4 tsp salt

1 cup pitted California dates, sliced

1/4 cup walnut meats, chopped

Heat butter and brown sugar until bubbly in pan until butter melts.

Remove from heat; beat eggs and vanilla; stir into first mixture until well blended.

Stir flour with baking soda and salt. Add to eggs; beat to smooth batter. Stir in dates and nuts. Turn into well-oiled 9" square pan. Bake 25 min. in med. oven, 350 degrees. When baked, remove from oven. Let stand in pan until lukewarm. Then turn onto wire cake rack to cool thoroughly. Cut into small squares.

To garnish, when lukewarm press blanch almond meat into center of each square. Finish as directed.

Makes 2 dozen brownies.
