The police magistrate was served with an order granted by the chief justice staying further proceedings in the case until the question as to whether a witness was exempt from answering if he had paid for liquor or not was decided by the supreme court.

ANOTHER RACE.—There was a very exciting race on East River ice on Wednesday last between Francis J. McKenna's horse "Black Sporter," and Donald Campbell's mare "Kate." The race was for \$10 a side. "Black Sporter" won easily in straight heats. Best time 2:50. The trotting of "Black Sporter" was greatly admired by the large number of people who witnessed the race. With a little more training "Sporter" would develop into quite a "flyer."

KING'S COLLEGE, WINDSOR.—The St. John Sun says: The board of governors of King's College have resolved to invite the several parishes in the maritime dioceses to send representative laymen, interested in higher education on church lines, to be present at, and to take part in, the proceedings of the centennial convocation in the month of June. This is a step in the right direction, and, if it be heartily responded to by the churchmen of these provinces, it must give a valuable impulse to the interests of their venerable educational institution at Windsor.

TROT ON CRAPAUD ICE.—Quite a crowd assembled on Crapaud ice on Thursday, March 13th, to witness the trot between James Kelly's bay stallion Royal Dean, driven by Mr. Patrick Kelly, and Patrick McKenna's brown gelding Sporter. In spite of the heavy track and the rain which fell at the time, the sport was good. The crowd behaved well, and the horses were started about half-past two in the afternoon. Shortly after the start, Royal Dean broke badly and could not be brought down till the finish, giving the heat to Sporter decisively. In the second heat Royal Dean did splendid work, and came in about a chain a head amid great enthusiasm. The same order was maintained in the third and fourth heats, giving the game to Dean, and the Messrs. John Coughlan and John Gillespie being judges, ordered Mr. Hillson to pay the stakes to Kelly, after which the crowd went home well satisfied with the fun.

HORSE NOTES.—We learn that Mr. P. C. Kelly, of Black River, Lot 35, has sold his handsome colt, raising two years, to Mr. P. P. Gilles, of this city, for \$110. This colt is sired by Parnell, bred by Mr. William McGrath, Milbrooke, and now owned by Mr. Gilles. This colt, has, we understand, been entered for the futurity stake next fall. DOMINION PARLIAMENT

Summary of Proceedings.

OTTAWA, March 20.

The Banking Bill was introduced to-day, and read a first time.

Hon. Geo. E. Foster said it had been decided to follow in the main the present system, and with certain improvements, to extend its provisions for the usual further period of ten years. The more important of these improvements he explained: The notes of all banks are, for the future, to be taken at par in all parts of the Dominion. Hereof the notes of the smaller banks have been accepted only at a discount in places remote from the head office, and persons who happened to go travelling with such notes in their possession have been seriously inconvenienced. Provision is made for the prompt redemption at par of notes of suspended banks. These are to be redeemed by the Government out of a circulation redemption fund of 5 per cent. of the average circulation, to be paid in two and a half per cent. on 1st July, 1891, and two and a half per cent. on 1st July, 1892. The fund is to be permanently maintained at five per cent. On the amount of average circulation on the money so deposited by the banks, the government will allow interest at the rate of three per cent. per annum. Heretofore new banks have been required to have a subscribed capital of \$500,000 and a paid-up capital of \$200,000. It is proposed to increase this paid up capital to \$250,000, and this will have to be bona fide paid in and deposited in the hands of the Finance Minister and Receiver-General. Sometimes in the past the so-called paid-up-capital had only been nominally paid, the banks giving discounts to their shareholders almost to the amount of the paid up stock, but such transactions are to be provided against for the future for the further protection of the shareholders. It is provided that at their annual meeting they shall appoint two or more auditors to examine the affairs of the bank, and a copy of their report is to be forwarded to the Government.

In the brief discussion which followed the proposed legislation was spoken of in terms of approval.

Sir Donald Smith alone expressed dissatisfaction with the measure, his speech being in the interest of the powerful banks. He thought it unfair that they should be called upon, as they were, to contribute strength to the weaker establishments. In the circulation security fund every dollar of note circulation should be guaranteed. Each Bank should deposit with the Government at least one-third of the amount of its circulation.

Mr. Kenny complained that the Allan Steamship Peruvian, which left Liverpool on March 6th, had not reached Halifax yet, whereas other steamers which left the same day reached New York in seven days. He argued that the Atlantic mail service should be improved. Mr. Haggard said the Government were taking steps in that direction.

After recess, the House went into committee of Supply, and passed the annual estimate. House adjourned at 1 o'clock.

British Politics.

LONDON, March 20.

The meeting of Conservative members of parliament, called by Lord Salisbury, was held at the Carlton Club House to-day. Salisbury made an address, in which he said that he regretted the slow progress in the House of Commons. The government, he declared, was compelled to deal with obstructions of a most determined kind. He trusted that every supporter of the government, at whatever cost to his personal convenience, would give unremitting attention to his parliamentary duties. The tithes bill and the land purchase bills were of paramount importance. The tithes bill must pass its second reading before the Easter recess. He believed that the proposals contained in the land purchase bill are such as to secure the unanimous support of the Liberal-Unionists. In regard to assisted education, on which subject there was much misrepresentation, Lord Salisbury begged the members to reserve their opinions until the measure is introduced. Lord Salisbury ridiculed the report that Parliament would soon be dissolved. He declared that the new Irish Bill would secure the possession of land to their property. He denied that the Government had any intention of handing Swaziland over to the Boers. Lord Salisbury also expressed the hope that the difficulty with the United States over the Behring Sea question would be settled soon but he said with such a susceptible nation as America, Great Britain must negotiate at the top of her voice.

Trade Relations.

WASHINGTON, March 20.

The House Committee on Foreign Affairs to-day, by a unanimous vote, instructed its Chairman to report to the House a joint resolution, that, whenever it shall be duly certified that the government of the Dominion of Canada declares a desire to enter into such commercial arrangements with the United States as would result in the complete removal of all duties on trade between Canada and the United States, he shall appoint three Commissioners to meet those designed to represent the Government of Canada, to consider the best method of extending trade relations between Canada and the United States, and ascertain upon what terms greater freedom of intercourse between the two countries can be best reached.

The Stumpage Question.

FREDERICTON, March 20.

After another whole day and evening of debate on stumpage reduction a vote was reached at 11.30 to-night, the Government being sustained by 25 to 15, all the members being present.

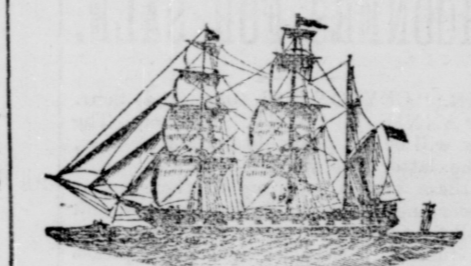
