MANUAL TRAINING SCHOOL

To be Established in Charlottetown in a Few Weeks.

Professor Robertson by arrangement met the committee appointed some time ago in connection with the Macdonald Manual School Fund at the School Board Office at 12 o'clock today. There were present Dr. Anderson, Principal of Prince of Wales College; Dr. McLeod, Superintendent of Education; Ewen Stewart, Supervisor of City Schools; S. Blanchard, Chairman of the City School Board; Dr. Taylor, D. C. Macleod, W. S. Stewart, Principal Seaman, Principal Landrigan and Mr. J. D. Collier, who is to take charge of the Manual School about to be established here.

Upon Dr. Anderson, the chairman of the committee, calling the meeting to order, Prof. Robertson said that since he had last met the committee he had visited Europe and had observed much of what was being done in Manual school work. He told the committee what was being done in the schools of England, Scotland, Ireland, Sweden, Germany, the great progress that was being made and the educational value of the work done. He fully explained the scheme upon which the schools were to be carried on. The school here was to be under the control of the City School Board for the period of three years. The Board is to provide room, heat and light, and all other expenses are to be paid out of the Macdonald Manual School Fund. He wished at present to make an agreement with the School Board as to the place in which the school would be held. He had visited several places in the city and considered the unoccupied room in the upper flat of Queen Square school to be very suitable.

In addition to the school for boys a school will also be established for the training of teachers who wish to get certificates to take charge of Manual Training Schools. This would be under the direction of the Board of Education.

The members of the School Board present were fully in accord with the project, and will meet early next week to complete arrangements for the establishment of the school.

Short speeches were made by several of those present, eulogizing the generosity of Sir Wm. Macdonald in starting the movement which Sir John Gorst says is the greatest educational reform of the century, and expressing their confidence in the ability of Professor Robertson to carry out the scheme he has undertaken with so much enthusiasm.

Prof. Robertson spoke of Mr. Collier, who is to take charge here, as a very capable man. The equipment of the school is now on its way from Ottawa, and the school will be in operation as soon as possible.

A vote of thanks was tendered Prof. Robertson, who acknowledged it in suitable terms.

THE RIFLE.—The Canadian Military Gazette of August 21st gives the complete official list of the scores made at the matches of the Canadian Military Rifle League during the past shooting season. Most of the teams in the list are regimental teams having from ten to a hundred men. There are eleven Rifle Associations, and in these our Queen's County Association has done well. There were four teams from it in the League matches, two of which are prize winners:—1st team, 3575 points; 2nd, 3470; 3rd 3070; 4th 2565. In the rifle association the first two teams hold third and seventh places.

MARITIME CHAMPIONSHIPS.—It is three years since Charlottetown made its first showing at the Maritime championships, at that time held in Halifax. Four athletes, viz., L. B. McMillan, D. A. McKinnon, C. J. McMillan and Lorne R. Uesworth scoring 27 points, only a few behind the Wanderers of Halifax, whose team won the trophy. The next year the championships were held in Charlottetown, and the Island athletes who competed under the banner of the A. C. A. C. scored 34 points against the Wanderers' 40. Last year at Moncton the Island boys chased the Haligonians even harder, but a ½ point separating them from the coveted emblem of athletic superiority. This year a determined effort must be made if they are to win. Halifax, St. John, Moncton and other maritime cities are vying with each other, and no expense will be spared by these cities in order to send a team qualified to carry off the wreath of victory. Let Charlottetonians who take pride in athletic development awake to this fact and help in every way the sending of a team that will show to America that Prince Edward Island brawn and muscle can hold its own with the best Canadian athleticism.
