Cape Traverse Notes.

A staff of engineers made an official visit by special train on Wednesday morning in connection with the breakwater, which will be commenced as early as possible in the spring. On Thursday they proceeded to Cape Traverse, there to make examination concerning plans for the construction of the proposed Subway or Tunnel across the Strait. This procedure will, of course, be looked upon by the obstructionists as another election dodge, as they are always ready to condemn everything taken in hand by the Government that may be for the public good, rather than go hand in hand with the projectors to encourage them in their honest endeavors to press forward an undertaking which is recognized by eminent engineers as practicable, and must be accomplished in the near future, and that, too, (humanely speaking) during the regime of Sir John A. Macdonald and his faithful band of followers, who are all as true as steel to the best interests of this Canada of Ours; and therefore I say "may their shadow never grow less."

That business is increasing, and visitors at this delightful resort more numerous than ever, is apparent by the two large hotels that are literally crammed day after day by business men and ladies and gentlemen from various parts of the United States and the Dominion, who seek out this favorite retreat for health and pleasure. The steamer Alameda made three trips last week to ports in New Brunswick, and will be fully employed until the close of navigation. Three new lobster factories have been recently erected here and expensive preparations are being made for next season's work.

George Irving makes daily trips in his beautiful boat, the L. H. Davies, carrying freight and passengers at reasonable rates to Cape Traverse. George is always ready, freight or no freight, to make his daily trips, and deserves well of the travelling public.

Telephonic communication is greatly needed. Will not friend Strang strike the key note, as being always the foremost man in every enterprise calculated to benefit the community.

**Sustentation Meeting.**  
A well-attended meeting in the interest of the Sustentation Fund of the N. B. and P. E. I. Conference was held on Friday night in the Queen's Square Methodist Church, St. John. Rev. Dr. Wilson, pastor of the church, presided, and the meeting opened with prayer by Rev. H. Daniel and singing. The *Sun* says:—

The chairman read the report, showing the contributions to the fund last year and the way in which the money was apportioned. The sum of \$1075 was raised in the Conference, in addition to which the ladies and the Sustentation Society of St. John gave \$200, and Edwin Frost, former resident of St. John, the same amount. This fund Dr. Wilson said he regarded as the sheet anchor of the home mission work. Unless the fund was sustained he could not see how the home mission work could be sustained.

Rev. W. W. Lodge, in a very eloquent speech, showed that the missionary enterprises of the church had for their object the salvation of souls. He pointed out the importance of sustaining the fund. It should be remembered that a large number of the conversions of this Conference last year were on the home missions.

Rev. George Steel was of the opinion that this fund was only in its infancy, but in some shape or form it would become one of the permanent institutions of the church. While he would not say anything against foreign missionary work, he felt that the people of our own province had a first claim upon us. If the Methodists of N. B. and P. E. I. were true Christians and true patriots they would agree with him and look after the requirements of the home missionaries.

After a few remarks by the chairman a collection was taken up, and the meeting closed with the doxology and benediction by Rev. Mr. Lodge.

**Boston Markets.**

BOSTON, Nov. 13.  
EGGS.—The market has been rather dull for the past week especially for held stock which is in heavy supply. Receipts are not so heavy as last week, but a good many were carried over and there is a large stock on hand. A good many western held are coming in in poor order and have to be sold down to 15¢@16¢. Strictly choice fresh laid are quite scarce and bring full price. Laid dull and easy. P. E. Island 26¢ per doz.

POTATOES.—Receipts show a further increase this week while demand has been hardly as active and prices have weakened on some kinds. Only very extra Houlton Hebrons are now saleable at over 83¢. and Rose have to be very choice to reach 80¢. Burbanks are in moderate supply and steady. P. E. Island Chenagos quite plenty at 78¢@80¢.

FISH.—Codfish are ruling quiet but without quotable change in prices. Bbl. herring still in light supply and firm. Mackerel in moderate demand with no change in prices.
