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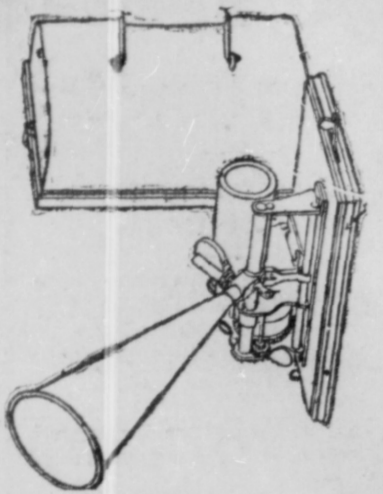

DISMISSAL OF DR. BLANCHARD.

DEAR SIR,—The public of Charlottetown were informed on the evening of the 21st through the medium of the organ of the corrupt and defunct Farquharson government, that "Dr. Blanchard, physician to the Hospital for the Insane, will sever his connection with that institution in February, 1900," because "Dr. Blanchard has other duties to prevent him from giving his entire time to the Hospital." The paper is surely ashamed of its master's action, and does not want the public to know that the doctor has been summarily dismissed after twenty-five years of faithful service, and the impression is wanted to be created that he was resigned. To all who carefully followed the evidence taken in the late investigation into the Asylum scandal, it will be palpably apparent why Premier Farquharson dismissed the doctor. The fate of the doctor was sealed when he gave evidence that he had refused to accept bad flour from Farquharson & Co., or bad food of any kind from the contractors for the government. Further still, he assented in piling upon his own head the inveterate hatred of the Premier when he made the public acquainted with the fact that while the previous trustees had made some 150 visits to the institution in one year, the present trustees had made 14 visits! The mutilation of Dr. Blanchard's report by Mr. Farquharson showed that the doctor had suggested the needed repairs long ago, and because he refused to become the tool of a government without a conscience he, of course, must go. The Farquharson government has clearly forfeited the confidence of the country, as was seen in the two late elections in Belfast and Murray Harbor, and to-day stands in a minority in the House. By what sort of reason, then, can they give an excuse for dismissing Dr. Blanchard, an old and tried servant, when the people of P. E. Island have dismissed them. Here is clearly a case for the incoming government to reinstate the doctor as one of their first acts and show Donald Farquharson how little he has, after all, to do in such matters. It was expected of the Premier and Commissioner of Public Works, from the enmity shown by them toward Dr. Blanchard at the investigation, that they would sacrifice him at all costs. But are these the men to rule the Local Liberal Party of P. E. Island, and wreck it completely, as they surely will? Where were the Hon. Benjamin Rogers and Mr. Arthur Peters when Dr. Blanchard was dismissed, and had they no kindly word to say for a man who for twenty-five years had looked after their poor insane, and who it will be admitted on all sides, is the very best fitted man within reach to look after them still. It is to be expected that Dr. Victor Goodwill, who was in our midst last July looking after his Company of infantry at their annual drill in camp, and whose knowledge in diseases of the brain must have been acquired since then, can fill the situation? Think of the absurdity of it for a moment. As well might you expect an unskilled man to handle an intricate piece of machinery. No one has anything to say against Victor Goodwill. He is a fine young man and a credit to P. E. Island, but he is quite unfitted to take charge of Falconwood. One has not far to go, however, to find the reason for the appointment. It is in the innate selfishness of Donald Farquharson who used the religious influence of Victor Goodwill's name to further his own political influence among the voters of West River who have the poor taste to return such a discreditable representative. What will Sir Louis Davies think of Dr. Blanchard's dismissal? Is it supposed for a moment that he will endorse it? Who should be summarily dismissed,—Dr. Blanchard who stood up manfully and spoke against the government who supplied these poor irresponsible creatures with bad flour, oleomargarine, bull beef, dirty meal, etc., and the government that would quietly allow such a scandal under its nose and with its full connivance? Such things should not be, and it is surprising that the honest and right-thinking part of the Farquharson government would allow the Premier such a free hand. He and James R. McLean are wrecking the Liberal party and such desirable men as D. A. McKinnon have to suffer.

A FELLOW FEELING.

The Ottawa correspondent of the Yarmouth Times report that "Thursday of last week two melancholy men might have been seen in this city condescending to each other. The pathetic meeting took place in the elegantly furnished place of business of the minister of the interior, who so far outshines any of his predecessors in the splendor of his tastes that he had special and elaborate quarters set aside for himself, thereby uncomfortably crowding in a great number of clerks. Mr. Sifton was brooding over the ghastly failure of his brilliant campaign in Manitoba, when Sir Louis Davies entered and talked about what had happened in Prince Edward Island. They had a fellow feeling. Each had been operating a local government machine in his own province for his own political benefit, and the advantage of the Laurier government. Each had dropped his duties and his responsibilities, and had rushed into a provincial campaign to save a local government. Last week Mr. Sifton saw the wreck of the Greenway ministry, which a few days ago, had practically the whole legislature behind it. Sir Louis Davies had to lament the fall of the Farquharson government in Prince Edward Island, which had a two-thirds majority in the house a year and a half ago. A fortnight ago the Greenway government and the Farquharson government existed to do the bidding of Mr. Sifton and Sir Louis Davies. Now there is no premier so poor that he will execute the orders of either one of them."

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

—In 1873 Japan had only 18 miles of railway, all owned by the State. The mileage is now 3,420, of which the State operates 768. They carry in a year 100,000,000 passengers and 10,000,000 tons of freight.

—Hon. Mr. Foster has been asked by the Conservatives of Queen's and Sunbury to be their candidate at the next parliamentary election. Hon. Mr. Blair now holds the seat. It is remarked by the Montreal Gazette that the people seem to be looking for a succession of Manitobas when they get a chance to express their opinions.

—Principal Grant, who was pro-Boer at one time, is now pro-British. The ultimatum, he says, changed the face of affairs, and raised the question whether Great Britain should remain in South Africa at all. Dr. Grant favors the giving to the Empire of all the help we can, and he maintains that we can afford to pay for what we do. It is strange that the principal should ever have thought well of the Boer pretensions. But no doubt he was misinformed. By most people it was known long since that the Boers wanted to control all of South Africa, and to drive the British, and, indeed, all other nationalities out. The day for exclusiveness has gone. If the Boers gave equal rights they would be fit to govern; but as they do not their rule cannot be tolerated.

—We are reminded today of Shakespeare's lines:

Now all the youth of England are on fire, And silken dalliance in the wardrobe lies; Now, thrive the armorers and honor's thought Reigns solely in the breast of every man. They sell the pasture now, to buy the horse, Oh, England! model to thy inward greatness, Like little body with a mighty heart, What mightiest thou do, that honour would thee do; Were all thy children kind and natural!

And now, as the Montreal Witness remarks, all Britain's children are proving kind and natural.

—A correspondent who thinks that the British officers in South Africa have been deficient in cautious reconnoitering, forwards the following extract from the history of Lord Roberts' Candahar expedition:—"From a cursory examination of the ground," the General says, "I satisfied myself that any attempt to carry the Babul Kohal by direct assault must result in very severe losses, and I determined to turn it. But before I could decide how this could best be done it was necessary to ascertain the strength and precise extent of the Afghan position. I therefore detailed a small party, under the command of Brigadier-General Hugh Gough, to make as complete a reconnoissance as time would allow." The intonation is that when Lord Roberts gets to South Africa he will impress on his officers the duty of ascertaining as nearly as possible the position and numbers of their opponents.
