STOCK BREEDERS' ASSOCIATION.

mixed with the potatoes afterwards. Mr. Raynor then dealt with the process of digestion and explained the action of different foods. Cattle should be fed twice a day. He would mix grain with the pulp roots. A two-year-old cow should have from 20 to 50 pounds of roots each day. He would recommend the feeding of sheaf oats,—at noon would be the best time. The amount of waste by feeding oats in the sheaf would depend upon the feeders. It is not possible to supply animals with sufficient water from the roots. When a cow is giving from 20 to 40 pounds of milk per day it does not seem possible to get along without water. Rape is equal in feeding properties to good clover hay. When it is impossible to sift oats it is better to feed wheat middlings. When oats are worth a cent a pound and wheat middlings are a cent a pound it is advisable to exchange. One pound of middlings and one pound of bran are better in feeding properties. Rape will taint the milk. Turnips will taint the milk also. Most of the cheese-makers are skilled men and they can tell easily when milk is defective. Raw potatoes in limited quantities, are economical feed for cattle. It is possible to feed more mangels than turnips. After the turnips have been in the cellar for some time a larger amount can be fed the milk cows. The best time to feed turnips is directly after milking.

Mr. Dryden said he would not like to see those present go too far with the feeding of turnips. He believed that turnips would cause a taint in the milk. This taint could be easily detected in butter a few days old. In fresh butter it is not so distinct.

Mr. Raynor, continuing, said that in regard to feeding horses he would feed the bulk at night. Heaves are very often caused by bad feeding on the part of the owner or keeper. Limited quantities of hay or oats are good for a healthy tone of the system. Barley fed in two-thirds parts will be found beneficial. Working horses should have three gallons of oats a day. In mixing the oats with the hay the oats should be cracked.

Mr. Raynor's remarks were illustrated by charts, and were greatly appreciated.

Senator Ferguson voiced the feelings of the meeting when he said he never heard a discussion on food and its properties given to such advantage as that of Mr. Raynor.

Mr. Elderkin intimated to the Association that on Friday last Mr. John I. Hobson, a prominent breeder living near Guelph, Ont., had passed away. He moved that Messrs C. A. Archibald, Senator Ferguson and Bliss Fawcett, be appointed a committee to draft a resolution of condolence to be presented to bereaved.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

At the afternoon session Mr. F. L. Haszard, who presided in the unavoidable absence of Mr. Elderkin returned thanks for the honor done him in electing him vice president of the Association. He would do the best he could to promote the interests of the Association. He also made a feeling and fitting reference to the late Mr. John Hobson, a gentleman who was largely interested in the raising of live stock. Mr. Hobson visited this province some months ago, and made many friends by whom his death will be greatly regretted.

He then called upon Professor Robertson, of the Experimental Farm at Nappan, who would precede Hon. John Dryden.

Prof Robertson expressed the pleasure it gave him to meet with farmers of the Maritime Provinces. The Experimental Farm at Nappan, he pointed out, belongs to the Maritime Provinces. As superintendent of that farm he wished to spend as much time as possible with the farmers. It had been his privilege to meet and exchange ideas with the foremost agriculturists. While in Ontario; a year ago, he attended a meeting of live stock show men; and that gathering impressed him greatly. Much of the prosperity of the country depends upon its live stock. When it is known that five-sixths of the growth of Canadian farm today is live stock it will be possible to understand the importance of stock raising. The knowledge of live stock depends a good deal upon the knowledge that is obtained at meetings such as these. At such meetings we not only quote what we have found out ourselves but we hear what others have found out. At these meetings the farmers consult and gather ideas that are of much benefit. This Association, he believed, can do more to promote the interests of the agriculturists of Canada than any other medium known. There are also the social advantages to be considered. The more the farmer mixes with his brother farmer the better for all concerned.

The Experimental Farm system is really a means to ascertain what is best in agriculture and stock-raising. Some years ago he decided to introduce stock on the farm. If he were a farmer, under ordinary circumstances, he would prefer to be a dairy farmer. He would run his dairy in the winter. Recently he made an experiment. Taking four cows in the spring and four in the fall he found that the ones coming in during the winter paid \$10 per
