Church of St. John the Evangelist Anglican Church At Crapaud Fire Damages Kildare Home To Mark 60th Anniversary

Crapaud's Anglican Church of St. John the Evangelist observes its 60th anniversary this weekend with special religious celebrations which begin tonight. This evening at 8 p.m. the sacrament of confirmation will be administered by Rt. Rev. William Wallace Davis, bishop co-adjutor of Nova Scotia, and dedication of the memorial organ in the church will follow. Afterward, a reception and special hour at Camp Kingston, adjacent to the church, at 9:30 p.m. will conclude today's events. On Sunday there will be Holy Communion at 8:30 in the morning, with the Bishop Co-adjutor as celebrant, and at 11 a.m. he will be the preacher at the eucharist service conducted by the rector, Canon T. E. Loder. The 60th anniversary services will conclude at evening when the preacher will be Ven. J. R. Davies, MA, rector-elect of Prince Edward Island. The choir and organist of St. Paul's Church in Charlottetown will provide the music for the services. This parish of St. John the Evangelist, dates back to the early years of the 19th century, and history records that the first services were held in private homes and in the school. In 1841 the first church was erected and it was used until

1902 when the church which is now the spiritual centre of the Anglican faith in the Crapaud area was built. The cornerstone of the church was laid in 1801 by Sir Louis Davies, afterward Chief Justice of Canada, and on Oct. 19 of the same year the edifice was dedicated by Bishop Courtney of Nova Scotia.

Tignish Home, School Hears Address On Mental Health

TIGNISH — Miss Carrie Thompson, liaison teacher with the mental health clinic, Charlottetown addressed the October meeting of the Tignish Home and School held in the high school auditorium Thursday evening. Miss Thompson explained to the parents and teachers the various levels children fall into. Those who are not able to cope with the regular school plan can be helped, she said through vocational type training. She further stated there is a great need for discussion, and interviews between teacher and pupil and parents to make a place for this group of children. Miss Thompson said special classes in reading will be set up in different centres to help children who have reading difficulties if teachers can be made available for this special work. Questions on school mental health services were answered by Miss Thompson. A record on child guidance, a follow up to Miss Thompson's talk was heard. Russell Perry, vice-president, chaired the meeting in the absence of the president, Valmore Arsenault who is at present attending an education conference of Cans Mutual Life Insurance Society at Madison, Wis. Sister St. Ellen read the minutes of the previous meeting and read a news letter on Home and School in other provinces and an entitled "Is the PTA doing anything?" Miss Carman Hogan gave the financial report with a cash balance on hand of \$33.63. Chairman of the various committees were called on to report their activities since the last meeting. Rev. Sister Rosalia, superior of Tignish Convent, chairman of the program committee, reported 22 new members since the evening that included Miss Thompson and her talk on mental health. Mrs. Foster Skerby, chairman of the membership committee, reported 22 new members since the last meeting with an overall total of 65 members. A Halloween party will be held in the Dalton School for grades one to four Oct. 31 and in the high school auditorium for grades five to 12 on the evening. Mrs. Wilfred Boyce, chairman of the finance committee, and her committee will have a party for the 500 children along with a film. Commenting on Miss Thompson's talk and the record were Wilson Shea, Gerald Henderson, Sister St. Mary Arnold, principal. A vote of thanks on behalf of parents and teachers was extended to Miss Thompson by Everett Broderick.

Fulton Visit Is Postponed

Word was received here yesterday that the visit of Hon. Davie Fulton, minister of public works to the Island has been postponed. A. Walther Gaudet, who had been designated as chairman of a dinner at which Mr. Fulton was to be present last night, said he had been informed of the postponement yesterday morning. **NO FUTURE DATE** — Mayor Gaudet said no future date was given for Mr. Fulton's familiarization tour of the Island's major public works projects, but he had been told that the works minister hoped to make the trip "as soon as possible." City officials were known to be disappointed over the postponement, as they had hoped to take Mr. Fulton on a tour of Victoria Park, where he would have been shown the decaying condition of the park's breastwork. The city has been trying for some time to persuade the federal government to share with it and the provincial government the cost of a new or completely renovated breastwork.

Jobless And Job Totals Both Decline

OTTAWA (CP) — September's back-to-school swing by young Canadians brought a sharp drop in employment and a moderate decline in jobless totals during the month. Unemployment declined by 20,000 from August to 260,000 at mid-September, it was reported here. Part of a joint statement by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics and the Labor Department. The total was 66,000 less than in September last year. School opening also produced an above-normal drop of 97,000 in number of people employed, to 2,385,000 from the August peak of 2,482,000. September's unemployment rate was 3.3 per cent of the labor force—lowest in three years—compared with 4.1 per cent in August and 4.7 per cent a year earlier.

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
