Film Made Of Canadian Sealer In The Antarctic

LONDON (CP) — The Canadian sealer Theron fills a star role in a new film released in Britain, and shortly to be shown in Canada. The movie, Foothold on Antarctica, tells of the Theron's battle against ice to land the advance party of the Commonwealth Trans-Antarctic expedition on the Weddell Sea.

In its 21 minutes' running time the color film follows the Theron,

and her Canadian captain, Harold Maro of Chester, N.S., from London to the cold, blue-bleak ice cliffs of the Antarctic.

It shows the tiny Theron trapped in ice, and the slow, nudging fight to open water. The film, sponsored by British Petroleum Company as part of its contribution to the expedition, was made by Derek Williams.

It is being shown at a London West End cinema.

Teachers' Workshop Plan Other Meetings

The Eastern Kings Teachers' workshop was held in the Murray River School on Thursday, November 22nd, with 20 teachers present. Mr. Cecil LeLacheur, the local president, gave a report of the workshop in Millville and some of the different Federation affairs. Mrs. Earl Clow was appointed secretary for the evening.

Different school problems were brought up and discussed from Grades I to X. Problems in Grade I and other lower grades were about reading and number concept. The general idea seemed that pupils in Grade I should not be rushed.

History seemed to be the difficulty in the intermediate grades. How to make it an interesting subject, it was generally noted that assignments of the lesson should be made the previous day either by questions, drawing or sand table. If in question form the questions should be such as can be linked together to form a story or essay and the children should be able to follow it in that conception.

Arithmetic, in installment buying was discussed for the higher grades. Importance of grading was stressed. Some of the teachers felt that if a general half yearly test set by the supervisor, be given to the pupils on the half year, it would be a great help in bringing the last term up to schedule.

This seemed to be in preference rather than ones at the end of the year. If tests for the end of the year are to be set for grades 8,9,10 they should certainly be Canadianized or set by our own supervisors or Regional High School teachers.

The problem of entrance exams, were discussed and it was strongly felt by all teachers having Grade X pupils that these tests be used and corrected by one thorough in knowledge of the Course of Studies set down by the Dept. of Education for those pupils.

The teachers discussed the Magazine question and all felt that it would be a much greater help if it were distinctly Prince Edward Island. It was suggested that the Magazine-to-be, be up to and including Grade X, with the grades up to VIII edited by Rural Teachers and that Regional High School teachers be responsible for the part up to and including Grade X.

Delegates were appointed to attend the Workshop at Montague: Mr. James MacBeth, Mrs. Florence Clements, Mrs. Gertrude Whiteway, Mrs. Hazel MacPhee. Problems of any teachers are to be handed in, so they can be in the hands of the Montague High School teachers before the meeting, and they will do all they can in answering them.

Mr. LeLacheur thanked all the teachers for coming and said they would plan another soon. He thought a meeting held every two months would be beneficial to the teacher.
