**WILMOT VALLEY** — Opposition to any changes in the provinces present liquor act was expressed at the annual meeting of the Grand Division of Prince Edward Island held in Wilmot Valley.

In a resolution passed at the meeting members opposed the change because of the "heavy amount of drinking in this province." The resolution called for no changes that "would tend to make liquor any more easily obtained."

The meeting also went on record as asking heavier penalties for persons convicted of drunken driving. It was suggested offenders lose their licences for three months on a first offence, one year on a second offence and three years for a third offence.

Members commended Prime Minister John Diefenbaker for "his firm stand in not using or having used any alcoholic beverages at state or social func-

tions for which he is responsible." Several speakers suggested that the present liquor laws were "very lenient" and Island ministers were urged to take a firmer stand on the temperance question.

**Operation of Purchase Fund**—It is a condition of this issue that the Company will operate a purchase fund.
