ESTEEMED EXCHANGES.

Mail and Empire: "At the very outset Mr. Mills ought to have been in the Cabinet. There he certainly would have been had it not happened that in the fixing of the qualifications for portfolios wealth and the ability to effect 'deals' were more telling arguments than mere brains. Mr. Mills is a strong constitutional authority, a voracious reader and a close thinker. In his hands the work of the Justice Department ought to be done well. It is to be hoped that as one of the Advisory Board or Cabinet he will exercise a moderating influence upon his colleagues and insist upon the throwing out of the bad material. There he can do good service to the country."

Montreal Gazette: Hon. David Mills has assumed the portfolio of justice in the Laurier Cabinet. Mr. Mills is best known for his long speeches and his philosophy. He is also to be credited with no small ability, considerable independence of mind, and purpose to do that which is right. He will be an addition to the strength of the better element in the government. He will do all that one man may to keep it in the path marked out by its members' ante-election pledges; and for this Conservatives as well as Liberals may be satisfied with his somewhat delayed recognition.

St. John Sun: In spite of the neglect and blunders of the Government in making the winter port contracts, it is likely that a large business will be done at this port during the coming winter. Some of the lines which have arranged to give a direct service expect to provide extra sailings, and it is thought that other steamship lines that have no subsidies will patronize this port. This is an evidence that a magnificent direct service might have been obtained for half the mail steamship subsidy. The Beaver line ships were all right for the experimental service, or for the small subsidy, but the best service they can give under the double port arrangement is far below what the country ought to get for the money it pays. This is no disparagement of the Beaver line company, which has always been popular in St. John, and of the management, which is enterprising and accommodating. The company is probably getting no more than it deserves for taking on itself the terrible handicap of the call at Halifax.
