

See Red Air Power Being Moved Into Southern Asia

 TOKYO (AP)—U.S. Far East Air Force command estimates that almost one-third of the Communist world's air power has been moved into Asia.

It also has taken note of a gradual shift southward from Manchuria and North Korea in Communist air power in the last year. "Such a shift would support any program to 'liberate' Formosa," commented Col. James T. Stewart, USAF assistant deputy for operations, at a military briefing for visiting U.S. newspaper men.

Stewart said Communist air power, with its weapons for mass destruction, remains the most serious immediate threat to free world security even though Communist nations have "a huge combined ground army and a significant number of long-range submarines."

STEADY BUILDUP

Stewart said a steady buildup of Communist air power in recent years has produced a Red air

strength in the Far East of 7,000 to 8,000 aircraft, against which the U.S. Air Force has in this area fewer than 2,000 planes.

He said the Communist aircraft were built by Russia and represent almost a third of the total now in existence in Russia and satellite countries.

The estimated total of enemy aircraft in the Far East includes: About 3,000 jet fighters, largely MIG-15s like those used in the Korean war.

2. From 500 to 700 IL-28 light bombers—"these are our main concern. They have the range to carry atomic bombs against targets in Japan, Korea, the Ryukyus and the Philippines."

3. 200 medium piston-engine bombers.

4. 200 TU-4 four-engine medium bombers" with enough range to strike any target in the Far East."

5. Several hundred light piston-engine bombers and attack and fighter planes.

"We must consider the Russian,

Communist China and North Korea air units as one air force integrated, closely co-ordinated, with a centre of gravity poised directly opposite Japan and Korea," Stewart said.

"This is a sizable military force with a considerable potential."

Students Stage Demonstration In Saigon

SAIGON, Indochina (AP)—Thousands of Vietnamese students, many of them from the Communist north, demonstrated against the three-nation Indochina Armistice Control Commission Wednesday, accusing it of favoring the Viet Minh Reds.

The students marched a mile through Saigon's streets to the commission headquarters. They carried banners proclaiming "down with the biased attitude of the commission which favors the Communists," "down with the Communists who have opposed the departure of refugees from the north" and "down with the Colonialists."

The demonstration was orderly. At the head of the parade were 100 wives of Vietnamese Army officers still prisoners of the Viet Minh.
