

CNR Introduces Speedy Rail And Road Services

MONCTON. — Faster freight service between Saint John-Halifax and Saint John-Moncton-Charlottetown Summerside, combining road and rail transport for maximum convenience to shippers and receivers, is being introduced today by Canadian National Railways.

Announcement of the accelerated services, which will speed freight shipments to Prince Edward Island by two days or more and provide a fast overnight service between Halifax and Saint John, was made in Moncton yesterday by Douglas V. Gonder, vice-president and general manager of the CNR's Atlantic region.

The CNR's region-wide road transport department, which operates more than 5,000 miles of Maritime routes serving thousands of cities and towns, has been enlarged with more equipment added to conduct the new operations in the three provinces. In both directions between Saint John and Halifax local freight will be carried in CNR highway trailers, which will travel on the highway between Saint John and Moncton, and on will be placed aboard piggyback "piggyback" rail transport cars on fast freight 405 from Moncton and Halifax. Montreal, arriving at Halifax at 7 a. m. the next morning.

Freight from Saint John destined for Charlottetown will be moved via "piggyback" baggage attached to passenger trains from Saint John to Moncton and Moncton to Charlottetown. Moncton shipments for the Island will be loaded at the Hub City.

Canadian National highway transports, operating on a non-stop express service, will speed freight from the mainland between Charlottetown and Summerside. This road haulage service will be in addition to the regular highway way freight now running between the Island capital and Summerside.

Effective Monday, Jan. 5, domestic freight for Halifax from Saint John will leave the latter city by highway trailers at 3:30 p.m. daily Monday through Friday. At Moncton and trailers

NO DEATHS Despite the bitter cold, no Texas deaths from freezing were reported during the day. Overnight temperatures around zero were predicted in the Panhandle again, and freezing weather over virtually all the state.

Natural gas deliveries to industrial users were curtailed. Lone Star gas company notified larger industrial customers of a 25-per cent reduction in their available supplies and said deliveries to those users would be curtailed 75 per cent at 6 a.m. today.

Cold weather was general throughout the middle of the United States and in the northern Rockies; 25-below weather was general. At Hibbing, Minn., and Big Piney, Wyo. it was -43, the coldest in the country.

TEXAS HAS RECORD COLD DALLAS, Tex. (AP)—One of the coldest "blue northerners" in Texas history shot the thermometer as low as 25 below zero Sunday as sub-freezing weather extended all the way to the Gulf Coast.

The weather bureau said it was the coldest morning the northern Texas Panhandle, snow-coated from an earlier blizzard, had ever experienced.

All known low temperature records were shattered at some points.
