LONDON, (Reuters)—Queen Elizabeth may travel alone to Scotland next month for her annual vacation at Balmoral Castle, it was disclosed Monday night.

Plans for her air journey north Aug. 7 make no mention of her children, Prince Charles and Princess Anna, who may travel to Scotland separately. The Queen's husband, the Duke of Edinburgh, will be away on a tour of Canada.

If the Queen makes the journey to Balmoral alone, it will be the first time this has happened since her marriage in 1947. But the duke is expected to be back from Canada in time to join her at Balmoral at the end of the month.

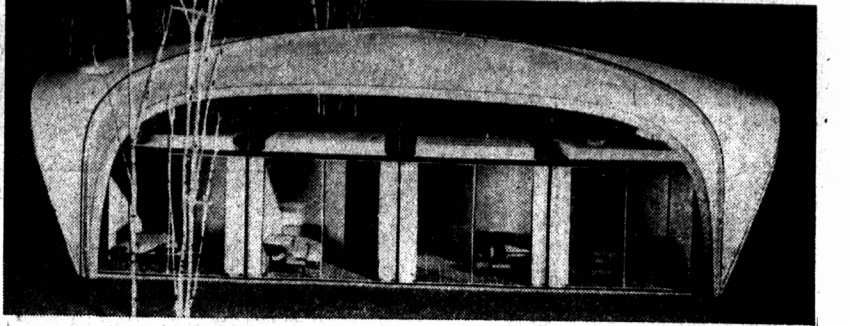

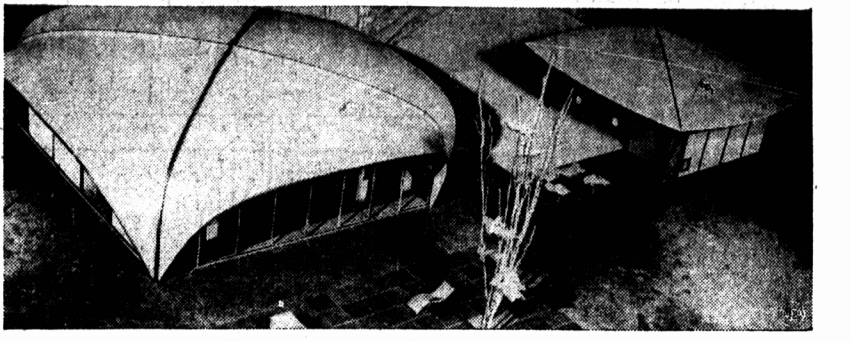

People anxious to purchase this modern, prefabricated all-electric home will have to wait until at least 1964. It was designed on the assumption that the average family of the future will be larger, have a greater income and will live in more distant suburbs. Designed by architect Elliot Noyes and General Electric, the home will have four bedrooms and a motorized living room mounted on a giant turntable that can be turned to face in any direction. Other dramatic features will be glass walls, central air conditioning and built-in kitchen devices.

to use just one drug for most acute infections as sometimes a combination of drugs diminish effectiveness. For instance, terramycin decreases the effect of penicillin if used together. Of course, tests are now available to see if the patient is resistant to a certain drug and if it so turns out, others must be used instead.

There are certain chronic infections where a combination of drugs has been found more useful. An example of this is tuberculosis where a combination of streptomycin and PAS (para-amino-salicylic acid) is used.

I have warned my readers before about demanding treatment with one of the antibiotics when it may not be necessary. Some patients think the only treatment that will do them any good is a "shot of penicillin". We should remember

that there are other agencies of healing and these powerful drugs should be kept for the time when they may be absolutely necessary. There is also the danger that using these strong drugs may conceal the symptoms of some serious disease or centre of infection which may require totally different treatment.
