

# NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

## AFGHANISTAN.

CANDAHAR, Sept. 6.

The Afghans fought bravely until Bahi Wali was taken in their rear. Then they lost heart and fled in wild confusion. The cavalry pursued them for fifteen miles up the Argandab Valley. Such portions of them as held together were completely dispersed, and took to the hills. This does not appear, however, to apply to the Cabul-ese regiments. Ayoub Khan escaped with a small following. The enemy's loss is not yet known, but it is said that 400 fell in the pursuit. The enemy left 200 dead in one village taken by General McPherson. The 92nd Highlanders, Ghorkas and Pioneers, charged the main body numbering many thousand men. We hold Ayoub Khan personally responsible for the murder of McLaine. Ayoub-Khan fled at 11 in the morning, leaving McLaine and six sepoy prisoners. They were soon after paraded for execution, but five of the sepoys escaped. The Afghans only saved their mountain battery. The enemy is so completely broken that further pursuit is useless. Probably Herat will rise against Ayoub Khan, who will fly to Persia, or surrender himself to the English.

LAHORE, Sept. 6.

The "Civil and Military Gazette" declares that previous to Gen. Burrows' defeat Sir Frederick Haines, commander-in-chief, and a member of the Supreme Council of India, protested against the weakness of Burrows' brigade and the Candahar garrison, but was overruled by the Viceroy.

LONDON, Sept. 6.

A correspondent of the Times at Simla, telegraphs the Government must now decide the Candahar question. It is impossible to bolster up Wali who is not supported by the people. We must annex Candahar or give it up to Abdurrahman or try to fund independent state composed of Herat and Candahar. The second plan would be the best one. A British force might be maintained, if necessary near Candahar in fortified cantonment, and the railway might be completed. The correspondent probably reflects the views of the Marquis of Ripon, Governor-General of India, if indeed the dispatch is not directly inspired by him.

## UNITED STATES.

NEW YORK, Sept. 6.

The probable loss of the steamer San Salvador with all on board is reported. She left Ruxido, August 7th for Havana, where she was due on the 11th and has not since been heard from. Her agents at Havana telegraphed that they fear she was lost in a cyclone on the 9th. She was an American steamer of 971 tons and has been engaged in the cattle trade between Cuba and Honduras, her owners being London merchants.

PITTSBURGH, Sept. 6.

The miners in the Pittston Coal Company, Seneca colliery, have struck owing to dissatisfaction in weights.

NEW YORK, Sept. 6.

A steamer from Charleston for New York, went ashore near Charleston, on Saturday evening. Her cargo was chiefly 1,000 bales of cotton—mostly on European account.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 6.

Gen. Longstreet, newly appointed minister to Turkey, arrived at Washington this morning.

ST. PAUL, Sept. 6.

A special from Fort Keogh says: The Sioux chief Big Road, direct from Sitting Bull, came in and surrendered to authorities to-day, with four followers. His party of 190 braves are expected to arrive in a day or two.

## EUROPEAN.

MADRID, Sept. 6.

Further accounts of the Logrono catastrophe show that one captain, six lieutenants and four engineers of the regiment from Valencia, and one lieutenant from another regiment, and ninety-eight privates perished. Next day in the presence of the garrison and an immense concourse, 110 bodies were laid in two graves.

PARIS, Sept. 6.

A boat belonging to Prince Galitzin foundered on the 3rd inst., off the Coast of Finisterre. Viscount Fleury, Mrs. Honnessy, and two natives of England, were drowned.

ATHENS, Sept. 6.

Men of thirty years were called out on Saturday which completes the preliminary stage of the mobilization.

SEBASTOPOL, Sept. 6.

About 25,000 Russians have arrived at Vern, which is a week's journey from Geok Tepe.

COPENHAGEN, Sept. 6.

Baron Magnus, the German ambassador, has been recalled on account of the Bernhardt incident and departs without having an audience with the King.
