THE Superior Court of Quebec has decided that the tax imposed by the city on commercial travellers is illegal, and in a test case brought before it condemned the city to pay \$150 damages for arresting a traveller of Montreal who displayed samples without first obtaining a license from the city of Quebec.

PIPES RESIGNS.

FIELDING CALLED UPON.

HALIFAX, July 15. Hon. W. T. Pipes waited on His Honor the Lieut. Governor to-day, and stated that residing as he did, in a distant part of the Province, he found himself unable to give to the affairs of Government that constant attention that was necessary on the part of a Premier, and he placed his resignation in the hands of His Honor. His Honor, while regretting that Mr. Pipes felt it necessary to take such a step, accepted the resignation, and invited Mr. Pipes to recommend a gentleman who in his judgment would be likely to perform the task of reconstructing the Government in such a manner as to retain the confidence of the Assembly. Mr. W. S. Fielding, M. P. P., was suggested, and later in the day was summoned to the Government House to consult with His Honor on the subject.

Another Accident to the International Line.

BOSTON, July 15. The steamer New Brunswick, of the International Line, collided with a schooner last night near Portland. She is badly damaged. The schooner was also much damaged.

Killed by Lightning.

Lightning struck the house of Allan Shaw yesterday and seriously injured five persons, one of whom, Mr. Shaw, will not likely recover. The house was much damaged.

A Dynamiter Arrested.

GLASGOW, July 15. The police here have arrested a man named James Walker, who is suspected of being a dynamiter. He made a desperate resistance and attempted to shoot and stab his captors. Important papers were found on him.

Terrible Mining Accident.

VICTORIA, B. C., July 15. By an explosion in the Wallington Coal Mine at Nanaimo, twenty-three lives were lost. All the bodies were recovered.

THE statue of Margaret Haughery, the first monument ever raised in the United States to a woman, was unveiled in New Orleans on the 9th inst., in the presence of an immense audience, including hundreds of orphans from the asylums of the city. Margaret Haughery was an unlettered Christian woman, who by her energy and industry amassed a competence. Although a devout and fervent Catholic, she knew no creed and recognized no faith in the dispensation of her benevolence. Although she responded to all worthy calls for assistance, she bestowed most of her bounty on orphans, and when she died she was known as the orphan's friend. The statue represents Margaret sitting in a chair clasping an orphan to her side, while her hand rests upon the child, who is bending forward looking up into her face. The pedestal surmounting the base is of Italian marble. The group is also of Italian marble. The entire cost of the decorations for the grand pedestal and statue will be \$6,500.

A WOMAN KILLED BY LIGHTNING.—The dwelling house of Mr. Ansel M. Bouchee, near Tusket Ledge, Yarmouth, was struck by lightning on Sunday morning, and Mrs. Bouchee, who was in the hallway at the time, was struck on the back of the head and instantly killed.
