Legislative Council Elections.

The retiring members of the Legislative Council were:

- Government: Simon Bolger, Hon. Joseph Wightman, Richard B. Reid. Opposition: John Balderston, Roderick Munn, Peter McNutt.

The members returned to fill the vacant seats are:

- Government: James Nicholson, James Clow. Opposition: John Balderston (Re-elected), Dr. Fraser, Joseph Murphy, Peter McNutt.

The Legislative Council will now, therefore, be made up as follows:

QUEEN'S COUNTY.

- Charlottetown and Royalty—Thomas W. Dodd. First District—A. B. McKenzie, John Balderston. Second District—Lauchlin McMillan, James Nicholson.

KING'S COUNTY.

- First District—Lawrence Kickham, Dr. Fraser. Second District—Thomas Annear, James Clow.

PRINCE COUNTY.

- First District—Benjamin Rogers, Joseph Murphy. Second District—Stewart Burns, Peter McNutt.

The result of the election is to be viewed from two points of view—the constitutional and the common sense.

From the constitutional point of view it clearly appears that a majority of the electors do not desire a reduction of the Legislature, and that rather than have such a reduction, they are willing that there should be a recurrence to direct taxation.

As the Government are compelled to look at the result from the constitutional point of view their duty is quite plain. The will of the people is supreme; and it must be obeyed. The Government must abandon, for a time at least, the policy of reducing the Legislature and go back to direct taxation, or they must resign.

Regarding the election from the constitutional point of view, this is the conclusion which must be drawn from the result.

But from the common sense point of view, the result has another and very different appearance.

No one in his senses, who is conversant with the circumstances, supposes that the defeat of Mr. Bolger in the First District of King's County was due to his faithfulness to the policy of reducing the Legislature, or to his aversion to direct taxation, or to the fact that the electors willfully stultified themselves and knowingly went back on their record regarding the question at issue.

It is also well known that the defeat of Mr. Johnson was not due to his straightforward advocacy of the reduction of the Legislature. Indeed the wonder is that, brought into the field at the eleventh hour, and opposed by a man who was "all things to all men and anything to get in," Mr. Johnson polled so large a vote as he did.

The cause of Mr. Johnson's defeat was also the cause which operated most of all against the return of Mr. D. H. McDonald. Mr. McDonald came so late into the field that neither his recognized and undoubted merits as a man, nor the reasonableness of the issue he espoused, could prevail against Mr. McNutt, who, in his card, issued weeks before Mr. McDonald was nominated, was careful to say "I am in favor of reducing our local legislature to at least one-half its present number but at the same time, I am most decidedly opposed to surrendering the right of property-owners to be represented in Parliament."

The truth is that although the issue was fairly and squarely placed, it was not fairly and squarely met. The Oppositionists shirked and shuffled; and they shirked and shuffled successfully.

The election is, therefore, no proof of the Patriot's declaration that neither the Government nor THE EXAMINER comprehended public opinion upon the question at issue. That the Legislative Council electorate were naturally chary about surrendering their right to vote and that they were properly very jealous respecting the safety of the interests of property were fully aware; and we advanced what we deemed to be good and sufficient reasons to meet these objections.

The promulgation of THE EXAMINER (on Saturday) that "winter might at any moment rush upon us" has proved true. Winter literally "rushed" upon us yesterday.

SCORES were before Alexander Hayden and Wm. Heard, J. P.'s, Emily Friddle, alias Hughes, of Victoria, and Harriet Snow, of same place, were this day convicted and each fined five dollars and costs or two months imprisonment.

THE Government have acquired the property of the St. Lawrence Dock Company, a little above the Grand Trunk Wharf, South Quebec, and intend erecting suitable buildings thereon for sheltering immigrants arriving there.

DR. J. F. BRINE, of Tyn Valley, has commenced the practice of his profession at Richibucto, in Kent County. He takes the office and residence of Dr. Moody, who is removed from the place. Dr. Brine has practiced his profession in Prince Edward Island for some fourteen years, and has gained a good reputation.

SOBERLY AFFLICTED.—Our readers will join in our sincere regret at the death of Allan Wilnot Currie, youngest son of Rev. D. D. Currie, which occurred this morning from diphtheria, and they will also be pleased to know that the other members of his family, similarly afflicted, are now out of danger.

JAMES S. McDONALD & Co's, brokers and insurance agents, Halifax, whose suspension was announced a few days ago, have issued a circular stating that owing to a succession of losses they have had to make an assignment to H. L. Parsons. They hope their interest in the Halifax Rancho Co. will prove a sufficient asset to discharge their liabilities.

FRIGHTS.—A St. John, N. B., despatch says: Quite an important crop in deal freights has taken place this fall, although at the North Shore a few engagements have been effected lately at a high figure. The new barque Neophyte has been chartered to load for Cork at 65 shillings per standard; barque Proteus for Liverpool, 61s 3d; Troop & Sons, barque Hornet (not yet launched), for Lisbon, at 75 shillings; barque Friedrich, East coast of Ireland, 70 shillings.

THE will of the late Mary M. Perkins, of Boston, reads: "I leave my husband," etc., meaning Ezra G. Perkins, though she did not describe him by name. John Harby, from whom she supposed herself divorced before marrying Perkins, now claims the property, on the ground that he was her lawful husband, the divorce proceedings having been fraudulent. The Probate Court divided the property between the two men, and the case is before the Supreme Court on appeal.

IN the vicinity of Pigeon Creek, Pennsylvania, there resides a man named Richard Hoffman. He has been for years a helpless cripple, let us say, unable to move about even with the aid of crutches. A day or two since, while being hauled out in a wagon, made expressly for him, he says a voice as from afar off, spoke unto him, saying, "Arise!" Thinking the command was from God, Hoffman attempted to arise and found himself able to do so. He is now able to go about as other men. The miraculous affair is vouched for by some of the best citizens of the country.

SIXTY trains passed inward and outward at Moncton Station on Wednesday.

THE train from Georgetown met with an accident and was also detained by storm to-day. Trains from Souris and Tignish were also late.

NINE cases of drunkenness were disposed of by the Stipendiary Magistrate this forenoon. Some of the offenders were sentenced to thirty days.

The steamer "M. A. Starr," arrived from Halifax, yesterday morning, with a full cargo. She will sail as soon as the storm abates with 1,500 cases canned meats and a large quantity of oats and barley.

The steamer "St. Lawrence," which went to Point du Chene on Saturday night, is detained there by the storm. The "Princess of Wales" left for Pictou at one o'clock this afternoon. She will probably return to-night and make a trip between Summerside and Shediac to-morrow.

WHAT may be termed the first snow storm of the season, commenced yesterday morning. About noon it was blowing fresh from the north and continued increasing in force during the night and this morning, the wind occasionally running up to 40 miles an hour. Up to this afternoon about nine inches of snow fell. Sleighs made their first appearance on the streets to-day.

A SCHOONER arrived from Montreal on Saturday, with a cargo consisting of three hundred cases of dynamite. A year ago, it will be remembered, a vessel arrived from the same port, and landed her infernal freight of dynamite. It was placed in a small warehouse in the suburbs, and while it remained there, the sensitive portion of our inhabitants were in constant dread of being blown off the face of the earth.
