Says Governments Exceeded Rights

(C. F. by Guardian's Special Wire)
TORONTO, May 8—Neither the Ontario nor the Quebec Governments had the right to interfere with agreements between the Ottawa Valley Power Company and the Ontario Hydro Commission to develop Chate Falls as a power site, declared W. N. Tilley, C. C., in arguing the company's case in high court today.

The power company seeks to have legislation cancelling power contracts with hydro declared ultra vires the Ontario legislature. It also seeks \$115,000 for power available to the commission when contracts were cancelled Dec. 6, 1935.

Roosevelt Seeks To Create Jobs
(A. P. by Guardian's Special Wire)
WASHINGTON, May 8—President Roosevelt made known today he was searching for ways to increase employment by seeking to remove impediments to expansion in the heavy goods industries, particularly home construction and railroad equipment lines.

Commenting on his recent conferences with industrial leaders the President said he was seeking suggestions for building up certain industries that have a large capacity for increased production, but were being held back for various reasons.

At a press conference, he said 1/2 talks with Bernard M. Btruch, Owen D. Young, Walter P. Chrysler and others were concerned primarily with how to improve railroad capital structures and with means of putting cheap homes, for which he said there was a great demand, on a mass production basis.

Lucy Harris Fund Reaches Objective
ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., May 8—(C. F. Cable)—A day ahead of its scheduled closing, the Lucy Harris fund reached its objective of \$2,000 today with subscriptions still arriving.

The fund is in aid of the nine-year old girl who was lost for 12 days in New Melbourne forest with nothing to eat except snow. Her courage amazed the world but the exposure she underwent caused the amputation of her feet.

PROBLEMS AIRD BEFORE COMMISSION

OTTAWA, May 8—A plea for improved reception of Canadian programs from spokesmen for Ontario, Quebec and Nova Scotia areas, coupled with a reiteration by General Manager J. F. B. Livesay of the Canadian Press of that organization's desire to serve the Canadian Radio Commission with more frequent news broadcasts, occupied the Commons committee on radio at its one sitting today.

The committee will sit again Tuesday when it will hear representations from telephone companies whose lines are used to carry network programs to radio stations across Canada.

Rev. H. A. Haslam of Yarmouth representing various organizations in western Nova Scotia, had a plea for Canadian programs. While stations in that district were able to get excellent reception of United States stations, they were not dependably served with Canadian programs. They were unable to get good reception of Canadian stations and needed either to have line-of-sight programs to their local station or to have power of the nearest Commission station increased.

K. J. Cochrane (Lib. Cumberland) presented a brief on behalf of Truro, N. S. Islanders who claimed there was local interference from electrical appliances and that authorities in that district claimed they had no power to compel owners of such appliances to correct the conditions that set up interference.

Mr. Livesay appeared to reply to statements before the committee yesterday by President Herbert Moore of Transradio Press Service, Incorporated, New York, with respect to the broadcast of news bulletins. Mr. Moore had interpreted representations made before the Commission April 7, when the Canadian Press urged that facilities be provided for more Canadian news broadcasts on the Commission premises as an effort to ban Transradio.

The Canadian Press, Mr. Livesay told the committee, had no desire to monopolize the air nor to ban the Transradio of any other news service. Because of technical difficulties the Canadian network was able to broadcast only one Canadian Press news bulletin daily. It was desired to supplement this by three day-time bulletins. All these bulletins were to be furnished five of cost so far as the Canadian Press was concerned.

"All the Canadian Press wants is to do a good job on Canadian air," Mr. Livesay said. "We are the opportunity we trust the Canadian people to prefer Canadian news to foreign. If that alarms Transradio it is just too bad."

taining the text of the questionnaire.

Chief questions asked Germany included:

1. Whether Germany regards herself now in a position to conclude "general treaties."
2. Whether the point has been reached where Germany can signify that she recognizes and intends to respect the existing territorial and political status of Europe. In other words, said authoritative sources, has Germany's craving for equality been satisfied.
3. Whether Germany's proposals for non-aggression pacts can cover at least Russia, Latvia and Estonia, in addition to Germany's immediate neighbors.
4. Whether the proposed non-aggression pacts between Germany and others state that her southern and northeastern frontiers may be guaranteed by mutual assistance arrangements.
5. Whether Germany is still prepared to agree to an international arrangement to prevent non-interference in the affairs of other states.

(No mention was made in the questionnaire of the point raised in the German declaration concerning colonial territories. In the Reich's memorandum at the time the Rhineland was reoccupied, it was said that Germany was ready to return to the League of Nations with the understanding that negotiations for an amicable adjustment of Germany's colonial demands would be undertaken.)

MONTREAL, May 8—Mothers Day, which falls on Sunday, May 10th this year, will be marked by thousands of orders of flowers being delivered in loving remembrances throughout the world.

Both the Canadian National and Canadian Pacific Telegraphs are making special arrangements to handle the heavy telegraph and cable traffic for the delivery of flowers all over the continent and the globe wherever members of the Florists Telegraph Delivery Association are situated and arrangements may be made by the sender for their speedy delivery at any time of the day. According to the officers of the telegraph companies, roses again are the most favored of the floral gifts but carnations and other flowers are also growing in popularity. To those who wish to mark the occasion by a telegraphed greeting, the telegraph companies have provided appropriate telegraph blanks and envelopes which will be delivered by unformed messengers.

Judging from the numerous inquiries made of telegraph agents, Mothers Day will set a new record for both floral and telegraphic remembrances.

House Approves C.N.R. Appropriation

OTTAWA, May 8—An appropriation of \$39,000,000 to meet deficits on the Canadian National Railways in 1936 was approved in the House of Commons today. It marks a new departure in handling railway deficits as hitherto they were voted the year after they occurred whereas they are now being voted in advance on the basis of an estimate.

Fire Destroys Home of Former Islander

The living quarters of the family of A. M. Warn, prominent South Park garage proprietor, which adjoin the garage at 14th St. and Dallas, was badly damaged by fire Tuesday night. The loss is estimated at \$1,000.

Thurston Warn, 9-year-old son, proved himself a hero when he went into a burning room to rescue his 7-year-old sister, Dolly, who was almost overcome in her bedroom. Thelma Warn, 12, escaped through the smoke-filled kitchen. The parents were in another part of the building, and the fire spread so rapidly that the children were endangered before the parents became aware of it. An overheated furnace is believed to be the cause.

"Dolly" was awfully scared—you should have heard her cry! So I just ran back in there and got her out."

In a matter of fact way, 9-year-old Thurston Warn today told how he saved his 7-year-old sister, Dolly, when fire almost destroyed the family home at 8510 Dallas Ave., last night.

Greater Regard Of Investment Rights Urged

SUDBURY, Ont., May 8—Appealing for greater regard of investment rights and more equitable view of taxation B. K. Sandwell, editor of Saturday Night, Toronto, addressed the conference of northern municipalities held here today.

"Nobody knows who is going to be taxed next," Mr. Sandwell asserted. "The situation leaves the taxpayer in a state of complete uncertainty. We are recovering, but the recovery is slow and it won't speed up till we have one condition which we have not got now. That is confidence in the people who will make long-term capital investments."

"It is not the taxes that are imposed but the taxes which are threatened that discourage investment," he declared. Mr. Sandwell made a plea for security against any measure of public dishonesty and "unknown and impracticable inroads into capital," as the only thing that would encourage returning capital investment.

The family was being cared for today by neighbors. The fire is believed to have started from an overheated furnace. Firemen believe the blaze smouldered between the walls, then broke out suddenly in several places. Warn operates a garage next door to his home.

Thelma is a seventh grade pupil at Cleveland Junior High School, the Concord School.

Mrs. Warn was formerly Miss Sadie Bell, Milton who taught school on the island for a number of years and later taught in Western Canada. This is the third time since leaving this Province that Mrs. Warn has been the victim of fire loss.

way to restore prosperity and ease the problems of government," Mr. Ferguson stated.

Although the past winter in Western Canada had been very cold, there had been heavy falls of snow which saturated the soil with moisture, he declared. The coming crop would benefit greatly by the condition of the soil.

"The insurance man saw signs of a return to ranching in many of the 'worst dry areas' which had, but which 'never should have been broken for grain farming' in their abandonment by wheat farmers.

"The return of prosperity to Canada's West would start the ball rolling throughout the Dominion, he thought. "We can't over-estimate the important influence of western prosperity on the welfare of Eastern Canada because of markets that exist there for products of industries of all kinds."

Visits to Canadian cities from the Pacific to the Atlantic during the past few weeks gave Mr. Ferguson the distinct impression that business conditions everywhere were "moderately improving," he said.

Life insurance sales had been following the same trend and there was a marked reduction in lapses and surrenders recently, he stated. In 1932 they had reached "abnormal proportions."

"The business of our own company has been very satisfactory, especially in the Maritime Provinces in the last fifteen months particularly. I am proud of the amount of insurance we have in force in these provinces. In Prince Edward Island the Great West Co. probably stands first among the companies doing business here," Mr. Ferguson said.

Mr. Ferguson leaves Monday for Winnipeg. He will visit Montreal, Quebec and Toronto enroute west.

Envisions One North American Economic Unit
