But not till last week were these private theatricals turned to practical account in the residence of William Rayden, Esq., who was opened to select audiences, and "Our Boys" in this way secured \$78.12 for the Charlottetown Hospital. OPPOSITION WITH A VENGEANCE.—Not content with its unheroic efforts to keep the Province saddled with the cost of our wharves or piers, the Patriot attacks our delegates with ruffianly missiles from the vocabulary of the fishwife. It has been supposed that the civilizing influences which usually surround the gubernatorial office, tend to raise and refine one who has occupied the dignified position. We have heard the uniform courtesy and politeness of Sir Leonard Tilley accounted for in this way, and we suppose it must be on the principle that the leopard cannot change its skin, and that the hog returns to his filthy habits that we now see nothing of the kind in the Patriot. SEALS.—The Evening Mercury of St. John's N.B., April 2nd, reports the first arrival from the ice—the steamer "Proteus," Capt. Pike—with a huge cargo of fat, consisting of 8,550 old hood seals, and 5,970 young hoods—in all 14,520 seals. The weight of fat is estimated at 700 tons, valued at not less than \$24,000. The "Proteus" made the trip in twenty-two days. The second arrival was the steamer "Ranger." She had 24,000 harps and the weight of 3,000 hoods—nearly six hundred tons. They were taken about seventeen miles off Spear Point, Labrador. The "Ranger" reports the following vessels:—

DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

The Budget.

OTTAWA, April 9. The Budget debate was finished at 2 o'clock a. m., on Saturday. The House then went into Committee of Supply.

Obituary.

Hon. Senator Gibbs is dead.

[The deceased was son of the late Thomas Gibbs, Esq., Ottawa, Ont. He was born at Terrebonne, Quebec, 11th March, 1821, and was educated in England. He was head of the firm of Gibbs & Bros., produce dealers and proprietors of the Oshawa Mills. He was a Director of the Confederation Life Insurance Co.; President of the Dominion Telegraph Co.; and President of the Standard Bank; Chairman, in Canada, of the English and Scotch Investment Co. of Canada; President of the Oshawa Harbor Co.; and President of the Ontario Loan and Savings Co., of Oshawa. He was a member of the Privy Council of Canada since 1873, and was made Secretary of State for the Provinces from that date until July 1st, when he was transferred to the charge of the Inland Revenue Department until the resignation of the Government the same year. He sat for South Ontario in the Canadian Assembly from January, 1865, until the Union, when he was returned to the Commons, where he continued to represent South Ontario until the general election in 1874 when he was defeated. Upon the death of Hon. Mr. Cameron the sitting member, he was again returned for South Ontario, continuing to represent that constituency until 1878. He was called to the Senate in 1880 where he well represented the Liberal-Conservative interests.]

The Dynamite Sensation—More Arrests.

LONDON, April 9. A man named Kerton was arrested here yesterday, in connection with the dynamite plot.

Two men were also arrested at Glasgow yesterday, on charge of blowing up the gas works.

A quantity of nitro-glycerine was seized in Cork yesterday. It was addressed to O'Herlihy who was recently arrested.

Penal Servitude.

LONDON, April 9. A bill was introduced in the House of Commons on Saturday, providing penal servitude for all persons convicted of illegally possessing explosives.

Arrests Continue.

DUBLIN, April 9. Eleven arrests were made in Ireland on Saturday. They are chiefly dynamite plotters.

Telegraph Notes.

The commercial treaty between Germany and Spain has been signed by both Governments.

R. C. M. Lovell, doing business as a coal merchant in Cincinnati, O., under the firm name of the Pioneer Coal Company, has failed for \$108,000.

The business part of Kentland, Indiana, was destroyed by fire on Wednesday night. The loss is \$100,000.

Neither Parnell nor any other members of the Irish Parliamentary party will attend the convention at Philadelphia.

The Norwegian ship "Zerka," Captain Jaspersen, bound for New Brunswick and loaded with petroleum, took fire at 10 o'clock on the 5th, in New York bay, off Staten Island, and was burned to the water's edge. The crew all escaped.

The revolutionists continue successful in Ecuador. Business in Guayaquil is at a standstill, owing to troubles there. The situation in Peru is unchanged. Minister Partridge is on his way to Washington.

All persons who contributed to the comfort of the members of the crew of the "Jeannette" and "Rodrigis," who were saved, and who extended courtesies to them, have been decorated by the Czar as a mark of his gratification at their kindness.

A fire at Iquique, South America, on March 10th burned ten blocks, and parts of four others, including railway offices and all the churches. About one thousand houses were burned. The loss is estimated at \$10,000,000.

There is great rioting on the Panama Canal, originating in race hatred between Americans and Carthaginians (?). About twenty Americans have been killed. The Government is unable to restore order. Arms are indiscriminately furnished; 8,000 men are drinking freely, and there is no knowing what results may follow.

Mr. Dawson, Lord Mayor of Dublin, not abashed at the recent failure in Limerick to raise a testimonial for Parnell, has set about forming a National committee to promote the plan, and to raise funds to present to the Irish leaders. A committee, composed of bishops, priests, and members of Parliament who adhered to the Nationalist party, mayors and public officials has been formed. The fund has already reached £800.

In the matter of An Act of the Parliament of Canada, passed in the forty-fifth year of Her present Majesty's Reign, Chapter 23, intitled "An Act respecting Insolvent Banks, Insurance Companies, Loan Companies, Building Societies and Trading Corporations, and of the President, Directors and Company of the Bank of Prince Edward Island, an Insolvent Banking Company.
