Chic Spinster Is Tough On Deserting British Husbands

LONDON (Reuters)—Slim, chic Joan Vickers, outspoken spinster P.P. Friday won the first stage of her campaign to help 70,000 British wives deserted by their husbands. Without a vote, the House of Commons gave second reading—agreement in principle—to her private bill. It would enable courts to order employers to deduct alimony from the wages of runaway husbands refusing to pay up. The bill also would allow women with illegitimate children to obtain maintenance money in the same way. Its provisions, covering England and Wales, already are law in Scotland. Silver-haired Miss Vickers, 49, a high-spirited conservative who unabashedly smokes cigars in public, received unexpected assistance from the government. Normally private bills stand little chance of becoming law. In Friday's debate, the government said her bill is "in the public interest because £10,000,000 of taxpayers' money is used annually to support deserted wives and unmarried women with children. The government spokesman added that 5,000 men are sent to prison each year for default of maintenance payments, costing the nation a further £1,000,000. Under the present law, it is the husband's responsibility to pay up or go to prison. His salary cannot be touched. Miss Vickers' bill has brought an unusual marriage of labor union and employer interests. Both groups complain the bill is unfair and would turn employers into "debt collectors." Miss Vickers, one of 25 women members in the 630-seat House of Commons, has received abusive letters since she began her campaign to help stranded wives. One, she revealed, declared: "I hope the next cigar you smoke slips down your throat." ONCE SHED SKIRT She added: "I've had hundreds of letters from all over the country. Those from men show they don't like the idea very much. One man said he thought I must have been crossed in love." Miss Vickers is used to the rough-and-tumble of politics. During her victorious 1955 campaign in Devonport, gossip circulated about "the day she took off her skirt in front of a strange man." To clear up the gossip, she explained: "While canvassing, I ripped the hem of my skirt and I asked at a house for needle and cotton. "A dear old lady invited me into her sitting room with her husband. I tried to slip the skirt around but had trouble. "Take it off, my love," she said. "My husband has been in the navy." Miss Vickers took it off, revealing a white petticoat. "What harm is there in being seen in your petticoat by a man?" she asked. "Particularly when it's a nice nylon affair."

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Veterans Request Pensions Boost

OTTAWA (CP) - The National Council of Veterans Associations has asked the government for an increase in the basic scale of war pensions. A nine-man delegation headed by Lt.-Col. Eddie Baker, council chairman and managing director of the Canadian National Institute for the Blind, conferred Wednesday with Veterans Minister Lapointe and senior officers of his department. The delegation represented several veterans' organizations. The council's main recommendations: 1. Basic rate of war disability compensation for 100 per cent disability be increased to at least double the 1939 rate. 2. A "substantial" increase in the helplessness allowance for totally disabled veterans who require the assistance of a constant companion. Maximum pension now is \$1,400 a year. 3. Pensions paid to widows of war pensioners be exempted from legacies under the Succession Duties Act as they now are under the Income Tax Act. 4. Pensioners be given free treatment and hospital care for any conditions and not just those arising from war disabilities. 5. Benefits of the Children of War Dead Educational Assistance Act be extended to children of peace-time servicemen killed in line of duty.

Canadians Guess Right Re Styles

MONTREAL (CP) - Canadian textile houses and manufacturers, involved each season in a frenzied guessing game with fashion, drew a sigh of relief Friday. The reason, said the Montreal Fashion Bureau, a dress house information service, pictures and stories just released of Paris spring collections show the Canadians have guessed right in predicting the season's top styles. Textile companies must work a year in advance to design fabrics and prints for the next season. Manufacturers need to plan at least six months beforehand the styles they will send to retailers. If their choices are wrong—and it's acknowledged that styles heralded by Paris sell best—their economic future can be bleak. Some of the Paris highlights, already forecast by Canadian manufacturers and fabric houses: 1. The popularity of crepes, particularly those made from synthetic fibres, of floral prints and polka dots as top fabric prints; 2. Low necklines in suits, as well as dresses—a favorite Dior idea; 3. Peg-top "bubble skirts," most noticeable in the collection of Jacques Heim; 4. From other designers, full-blown skirts and shirtdresses of bloused-waist dresses.
