## LORD ROBERTS IS NOW READY

### FOR AN ADVANCE INTO THE ENEMY'S COUNTRY.

### When the Rains Cease the Army Will Move Forward.

The Movement Will be a Resolute One—The Boers Prepared for Resistance—Reinforcements Have Reached Lord Roberts—Civilians Forbidden to Carry Arms.

SPECIAL DESPATCH TO THE EXAMINER.

ROBERTS READY.

LONDON, April 20.—Lord Roberts is now ready for an advance into the enemy's country.

Such despatches as are allowed to come through indicate that everything is in shape, and that as soon as the rains cease the army will move forward.

Great preparations have been made by both sides,—the Boers for a most desperate resistance and the British for a most resolute kind of forward movement.

The army now has plenty of water, thanks to the rain. While it delayed the onward movement, it probably has been of greater benefit to the army than if it had remained fair, as the men and horses are now a-sore of plenty of water.

Reinforcements have reached Lord Roberts, filling up all brigades and regiments to their full strength, and remounts have been furnished, and in fact the army is in better condition than at any time since it started after Cronje when he was confronting Lord Methune at Magers fontein.

From the other fields of operation, everything seems to be in the dark.

Evidently both sides are quietly waiting until the outcome of Lord Roberts' movement is known, whether he will be successful or not. Boer reports from Aliwal North are that from 8000 to 10,000 Boers are at Wepener.

A despatch to the Post from Kimberley, dated Wednesday, says: Lord Methune has issued a proclamation forbidding civilians to carry arms without military permit and ordering rebels to surrender all their serviceable modern arms by May 26th.
