

Shaw Cabinet Today Visits Summerside

SUMMERSIDE — Premier Walter R. Shaw and his cabinet will hold their meeting here today during a day-long visit to the town.

The busy itinerary begins at 10 a.m. with the cabinet visiting the Prince County Hospital site where Premier Shaw is expected to participate in a ceremony which will include the driving of a spike into the structure.

From there the group will travel to the recently renovated Summer Street Elementary School and then on to the High School where they will view a scale model of the new high school being constructed on Central Street. They will then proceed to the school site.

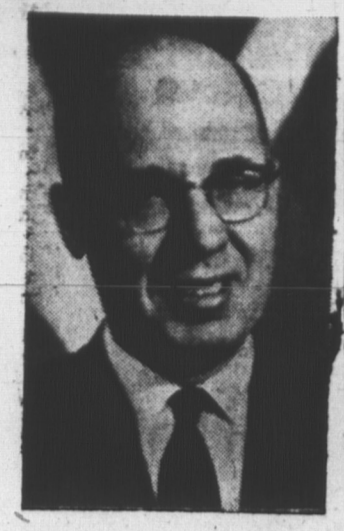
The next stop will be Prince County Vocational High School where the Premier will be shown the site of the proposed indoor swimming pool which is the anticipated 1967 Centennial project for the town.

The last call before lunch will be a visit to the project involving the widening of Water Street west.

The election of Melvin J. McQuaid, PC candidate for Kings, in next Monday's federal election, is regarded as a necessary factor in the further economic and industrial development in Kings County.

The past two years have witnessed a marked industrial expansion in Kings, under the Progressive Conservative government of Walter R. Shaw. Establishment of Langley Fruit Packers Ltd., Montague; and Gulf Garden Foods and Bathurst Marine, at Georgetown; and the continued expansion of fisheries operations at several Kings centres, including Souris and Morell, have injected new life into this section of the province.

As part of the PC party's plan for economic development, which has already fostered roads, water sources construction, the ARDA program, and expansion of fisheries, the election of a PC member for Kings is seen as the connecting link in the federal-provincial chain that will assure Kings of further development, and consolidation of the many newly-established industrial plants in the county.

PC observers point out that their party's policy of development for Kings contrasts sharply with the policy of the Liberal party, as outlined in the report of the Gordon Commission, which recommended that this area be written off in the overall picture of economic and industrial development for Canada, with the surplus labor force in this area migrating to heavily industrialized centres in Quebec and Ontario.

Melvin J. McQuaid—because of his experience in federal-provincial government affairs, in civic affairs, and through his close association with such organizations as the Atlantic Development Board and the Board of Trade—will be in position, if elected, to assure further development in Kings, so that the county can reap its rightful share of the prosperity that awaits a rapidly-developing Canada.

Reid Case Adjournd

Scheduled to be heard in Supreme Court yesterday, the case of John Reid versus the City of Charlottetown was adjourned to Dec. 8 at the request of counsel for the plaintiff Reid.

In an action in which he is joined by his sister, Elizabeth Reid, the plaintiff is suing the City, Police Chief Sterns Webster and Police Sgt. Charles Ready for \$146,000. The action arose from the closing of a restaurant, Johnny's Fish and Chips, and subsequent court proceedings before Magistrate James Haslam in City Police Court.

Reid's conviction was followed by an appeal before the Supreme Court which was allowed. He then instituted proceedings against the city. Mr. Reid is represented by Allison Gillis while Gerald Foster is the attorney for the defendants.

Obscene Words Bring \$20 Fine

Leslie Thomas Myers, Mt. Stewart, was fined \$20 and costs or 10 days on a charge of causing a disturbance by using obscene language by Magistrate James B. Johnston, QC, in Queens County Magistrate Court yesterday. Alan Scales, QC, represented the accused.

The charge against Helen Josephine MacDougall of Mt. Stewart of causing a disturbance by swearing was dismissed.

Aldon Leslie Horton, Peters Road, was remanded to Nov. 8 on a charge of break, entry and theft. He is accused of breaking into the Eldon Royal Canadian Legion Home and stealing 30 pints of beer. The accused pleaded guilty to the charge following his election of trial by magistrate without a jury.

Three persons were each fined \$20 and costs or 30 days on charges of illegal possession of liquor.



Drunk Driving Nets 10 Days

A Charlottetown resident, Gerald W. Mercer, was arraigned before Magistrate James Haslam QC, in City Police Court yesterday on a charge of driving without due care and attention. The accused pleaded not guilty, but was convicted and charged and was fined \$50 and costs or 30 days.

Austin G. Trainor, Bristol, charged with drunken driving, pleaded guilty and was sentenced to 10 days in Queens County jail.

Joseph Murphy, city, was sentenced to 10 days in jail on a vagrancy charge.

There were seven drunk and incapable cases on the docket. Six of the accused were convicted and another had his case remanded until Nov. 3.

Three men arraigned on a charge of illegal possession were each fined \$30 and costs or 30 days.

There were three city youths charged with disorderly conduct and each was remanded till Nov. 2.

Do Commission Jobs, Senator Cameron Says

OTTAWA — Much of the work now performed by royal commissions could be undertaken by committees of the Senate, Senator Donald Cameron of Banff, Alberta, said here in an interview.

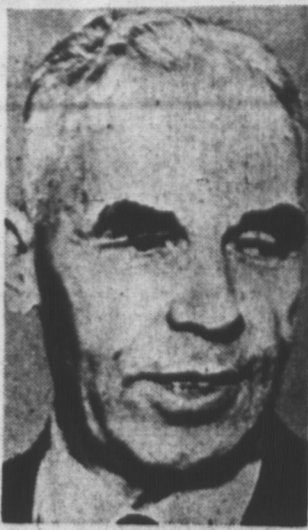
The Independent Liberal Senator, who was summoned to the upper chamber in 1965, said the Senate could be more useful if it was given more work.

"The Senate has demonstrated its capacity and ability through special committees on manpower, on the problems of the aging and on the Joint Senate-Commons committee on consumer credit," Senator Cameron points out. "Many of the problems now sent to royal commissions at considerable expense and time, could be tackled by Senate committees."

The outspoken Banff Senator admits some Senators do not relish additional work and are quite content to do as little as possible. But there are many others who are willing and anxious to be given greater responsibility.

CHANGE IN METHOD — He agrees with some of the criticism of the upper house of parliament, and says there should be a change in the method of senatorial appointments. He feels that perhaps half of the senators should be appointed by provincial governments. In this way, some of the parties not now represented such as the New Democrats and Social Credit, would have some representation.

"The New Democratic Party is the only one favoring outright abolition of the Senate, but its view will not be very popular in some parts of the country. Quebec and the Atlantic Provinces still regard the Senate as the de facto central federal authority," Senator Cameron says.

Interment will be in Montross cemetery.

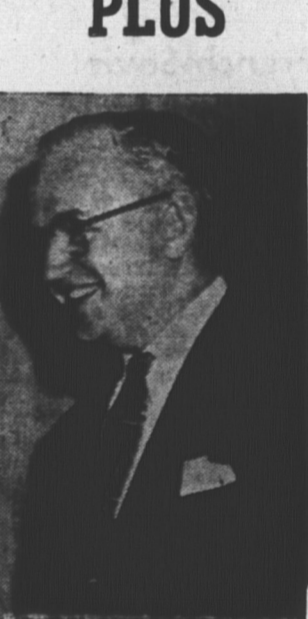
