The Behring Sea Question.

Liberal Opinion in England.

LONDON, March 26.

The cable despatches giving the draft of the Behring Sea correspondence as laid before the United States' senate have incited the Opposition to adopt an attitude of opposition on the question. A week ago Liberal leaders were inclined to support Salisbary. Liberal organs until yesterday took a view adverse to the United States' Government. Now the whole tenor of the opinions expressed in the lobby of the House of Commons indicates that the Opposition means to seize the chance to arraign Lord Salisbary as pursuing a needlessly vexatious course, instead of assenting to the reasonable arrangement offered by the Washington government.

OTTAWA, March 26.

The Militia Department has given permission that the badges given by the Canadian Militia R.R. League may be worn by militiamen in uniform, on the left arm.

Everything is quiet around the Parliament Buildings. Nearly all the members are out of town.

The Cabinet held an all-day session yesterday, considering the supplementary estimates.

The serge patrol jacket pattern approved for the imperial army has been adopted for the officers of the Canadian militia, and will be worn by them in marching, field day, and drill order.

Henry Rochefort, the editor, has been sentenced to prison for one year and to pay three thousand francs for publishing insulting articles against the public prosecutor.
