Fine Weather In Striking Contrast To Last Year's Blast

A year ago yesterday marked the first cold spot for the winter when the thermometer dropped to 2 below zero between 7 and 8 a.m. at the Experimental Farm. During the day it rose slowly and by 2.30 p.m. a temperature of 4 above zero was recorded, which increased in mildness until it was 8 above at 8.30 p.m.

28 miles per hour made the cold more felt than the thermometer reading would indicate. This cold snap was followed on the 15th by a severe snow-storm which brought vehicular traffic to a standstill. Twenty snow plows under Government supervision were kept working most of the night of the 15th and all day on the 16th, in the almost hopeless task of getting the main highways opened in the teeth of the high winds which packed the cuttings as fast as they were cleared. Late at night traffic to key points on the paved highways was possible but the secondary and minor roads were blocked solid. At the same time the city plows were working without interruption

for two days and a night clearing the areas and sidewalks around the parking meters. The Islanders hockey team returning from their three day road trip to Cape Breton spent the night of the 16th, on the car ferry Abegweit after their bus became stuck a short distance outside Borden. In comparison, the temperature reading at the Radio Range station yesterday at 7 a.m. was 32 and the high during the afternoon was 42.

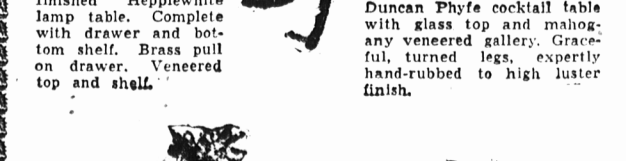

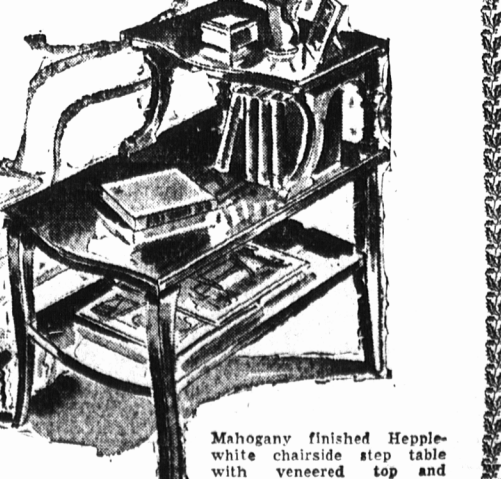
