Eastern Echoes.

The Maggie Alice, Capt James Lanni-
gan, sailed on the 21st with a cargo of
cattle and produce for the St. Pierre, Miq.,
market. This is the first departure this
spring from the Island for a foreign port.
Her enterprising captain and owner is de-
serving of every praise. One passenger for
Lamaline is on board.

It was thought that the heavy north-
westerly wind of last week had cleared the
coast of ice. Since then, however, the
north shore has become packed again with
it. The south side is unobstructed, and so
also will be the north side after the next
southeasterly breeze.

On Tuesday evening last D. Montgomery,
Esq., Superintendent of Education, delivered
a most interesting and instructive lecture
on Education, in Souris Court House. Mr.
James McQuaid occupied the chair. At
the close, the Rev. D. F. McDonald and
Mr. Landrekin, teacher, made complimen-
tary remarks, and moved a vote of thanks,
to which the learned lecturer responded in
appropriate words. On Thursday evening
in the same place, another lecture entitled
"Building our own Monuments" was
given by the Rev. James Carruthers, of
Charlottetown. Mr. A. Currie presided as
chairman. All present enjoyed a rich
literary treat. Mr. Carruthers is deservedly
entitled to rank among the most popular
lecturers in the Dominion. The usual vote
of thanks was given.

The little Telephone, published at Souris,
for some time back, has succumbed to the
inevitable, and will be seen no more. This
is to be regretted, as it was always nowy,
dignified and patriotic. One would imagine
that there is news enough in that part of
the country at all times to fill half a dozen
papers like the Telephone.

A singing school, by Mr. John Ferguson,
is to take the place of skating rink amuse-
ments at Souris for the next few weeks. It
commenced last evening in the schoolroom
under very favorable prospects.

It is pleasing to know that the wife and
family of Rev. D. H. Lodge are all safely
recovering from a severe attack of scarlet
fever.

The British Budget.

The budget presented by the Chancellor
of the Exchequer, a few days ago, shows
that the expenses exceeded the estimates
by £11,600, and receipts exceeded the esti-
mates by over £3,000,000. The duty on
alcoholic beverages realized over £5,800,-
000. The beer duty exceeded the estimates
by £270,000. The duty on foreign spirits
exceeded the estimates by £421,000, on
home spirits by £1,101,000, and on wine
by £12,000. The total receipts from alco-
holic beverages exceeded the estimates by
£1,890,000. The duties on coffee, cocoa
and chicory showed a decrease of £17,500,
while the duties on tea showed an increase
of £40,000. Commenting on the gross
revenue from alcoholic beverages, £22,265,-
000, Mr. Goschen said the figures showed a
universal rush to the beer barrel, the spirit
bottle and the wine decanter. Everybody
seemed bent on basting the national pros-
perity and increasing the revenue. It was
a circumstance that must be deplored. A
closer examination would not diminish the
surprise, for the largest increase had been—
of all the spirits in the world—from rum.
(Laughter.) The rum was drunk mainly at
seaports. In 1888 the number of drums
taken reached 245,000,000; in 1889, 274,-
000,000. It was an extraordinary historical
fact that in the years 1875 and 1876, the
greatest drinking years recorded, there was
precisely the same rush and precisely the
same proportion of revenue from different
spirits. Increased prosperity, therefore,
meant a great increase in the consumption
of alcoholic drinks.

It appears that the national debt during
the last three years had been diminished
£23,323,000. This was the largest reduc-
tion of the debt during the same length of
time. Mr. Goschen estimated there would
be an expenditure of £26,857,000 during
the coming year and a revenue of £90,-
406,000.
